Personal Statement

I have always been passionate about our beautiful island and fascinated by its history. I grew up in St Martins and have lived in the Forest, St Pierre du Bois and Torteval. I have been married for 30 years and have two grown up children. My working life has mostly been involved in accounts or banking and I have always been heavily involved in the community. I served as Constable of Torteval for nearly 5 years, being responsible for the day-to-day administration of the parish.

Manifesto

I have been privileged in my first term to sit on both Education Sport & Culture and Home Affairs. I have also sat on many sub-committees: Government Work Plan (GWP), Parish Working Group, Children & Young Peoples Board, Vice-Chair on 10 School Governing Boards and many School Committees, Blue Plaque, several Employment Panels, CPA Executive Committee, and lead on both Liberation Day and Domestic Abuse & Sexual Violence, working with many exceptional people.

At the beginning of the term, I joined Policy & Resources sub-committee – the Government Work Plan. It gave me a broad overview of the work proposed across the States. We will, this term, need to continue with plans to invest in several projects including: Housing, Les Ozouets Post 16 Campus, Hospital Second Phase, St Sampsons Harbour; in addition, the future of our Dairy, our Air & Sea links, Ports, Energy needs and investment in our public services - the list goes on.

Making sure we can balance the books is essential. The tax reforms are already approved and need to be implemented early in the term.

Housing - Investing in Affordable Housing, both for renting and buying is on everyone's agenda. A great deal of work has been done across committees this term, bringing all the work streams together, in a new Housing Committee, whilst relaxing perceived demands (GP11) on developers. We should hear soon some positive news on homes in the pipeline. It is essential that we see spades in the ground, as we most certainly want to encourage our young people to stay on Island or come back and raise their families.

Health - We have so many aspects of Health and Social Care that will have to deal with in the next Assembly: whether it is a root and branch review of Health Services; looking at an achievable and

affordable universal entitlement of care; or dealing with our Supported Living and Ageing Well Strategy (SLAWS). Investing in the second build phase at the hospital to future proof our medical services remains to be finalised.

Education and the Economy - If we want business to invest in our Island, we must skill and upskill our workforce to build our economy for Guernsey to prosper. We need to demonstrate that we not only value but are willing to invest in education.

Investing in our infrastructure seems to have been neglected over many years, when savings needed to be found in budgets; it may have been seen as an easy option when committees held their own maintenance budgets, before they were taken on centrally. But I think this was a false economy. We saw when taking up our seats in Education Sport & Culture in 2020, that many schools had not had general maintenance for some time, along with the College of Further Education, which was in a poor state. We have been on catch-up with general maintenance and upgrades to accommodation.

Les Ozouets Post 16 Campus is progressing, and it will be transformative for Guernsey. Bringing all students together, whether studying for Academic, Vocational or Professional qualifications, ultimately not only to show business that we are investing in our Island, but it is important that both our students and staff feel valued. We need to progress the sixth form to prevent costs rising.

We must invest in our young people starting with Early Years, developing strong building blocks for the future by supporting children with additional needs, maximising their opportunities to succeed and reach their potential as they move through education.

Once the Secondary Phase1 move is completed in September 2025, then the Primary Review can take place, looking at which areas housing have been allocated to and confirmed by the DPA, establishing if a new school may need to be built. Certainly, there will be a great deal to consider.

We have invested in our School Governing Boards to challenge and support our school leaders. We have seen coming out of Covid that our teachers worked incredibly hard and brought in a new curriculum to engage students. We have seen all our schools inspected, have achieved many Good Ofsted Reports, and are working towards Excellent status.

Headteachers are rightly proud of their schools, staff and students – so let's give them our support. For after all, children are our future.

Taxes - There is no getting away from it - Guernsey is an expensive place to live.

Unfortunately, like nearly all jurisdictions, it has become impossible to do all that has come to be expected by Islanders with 20% income tax- without cutting services. Therefore, a package of measures are now needed, with those on low incomes protected, which seems to be the fairest way forward.

Having attended two Fiscal Policy Panels presentations this term, I recognise we must put in place our agreed package of tax reforms early in the term.

Corporate Tax has always been part of any solution, more recently an offshore windfarm may help in the future, possibly in ten years' time which would certainly be welcome. At present however, we are spending more than we are earning, and we need to face that today.

I am a supporter of a tax package similar to that put forward in 2023, because a large proportion of islanders would be better off.

- With 15% income tax band on income up to £30,000;
- An increase in allowance of £600, saving £120 per year;
- A restructure of Social Security contributions, which would gain an individual £600 per year;

 A 5% GST (not including mortgages or rent) and an uplift on Pensions and Benefits. A scheme to provide financial support to certain low-income households, outside of the benefit system.

A person earning on average £37,000 per year, would have been £900 better off.

We must also support the Charity sector.

Jersey brings in £125 million each year, with their consumption Tax package.

Guernsey had a purchase tax after the war, and when the Island got back on its feet, it was subsequently removed. If the offshore windfarm were to become a reality, then the consumption tax could possibly be removed.

Safe and Secure - Home Affairs have been very ambitious this term, with an extensive range of work completed. I have been privileged to lead on Domestic Abuse and Sexual violence.

We take for granted that our Island is safe and secure. A great deal of work goes on in the background, which needs continued investment.

Training across our services and third sector needs to continue for dealing with the new legislation we have brought forward, which included suites of legislation to protect victims of Domestic Abuse, along with a pilot Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC). Plans are being drawn up to progress a new Refuge, using funds from Seized Assets (Proceeds of Crime). We have put in place Operation Encompass (connecting schools and police, when there has been an incident of Domestic Abuse the night before) and a Digital Safety Officer, working across the community. We very much appreciate and have supported the work of Safer, Victim Support & Witness Support and Safety Net.

I **fully support** Licensed Medical Cannabis, as outlined by the National Institute for Clinical Excellence (NICE) guidelines.

Home Affairs has been working with Health and Social Care this term following concerns raised by Heads of Departments, and Professionals across the two committees.

The sheer escalation of prescriptions (200 in 2021 up to 17,000 in 2024) caused alarm; the consequence of an increase in diversion (individuals sharing illegally) of Unlicensed Medical Cannabis, seen in our community by Heads of Departments. This prompted a report request by MDAG (Medical Drug Advisory Group). The report produced in May 2023 called: "Appraisal into the Diversion of Controlled Drugs, in the Bailiwick of Guernsey" reported the concerns from each operational sector. A range of recommendations were highlighted. Due to the absence of safeguarding and regulation around private clinics, which prescribe unlicensed Medical Cannabis (unlike all other controlled drugs), there are no quantity, strength, or formulation requirements of the untested product, or a requirement to contact patient GPs before prescribing.

Consequently, we welcome clear regulations to be put in place to control all of the above, as a priority.

Community and Third Sector - Working with the third sector, who are commissioned to work across many of the committee mandates I have served on, I know they are amazing contributors to our community. We simply could not hope to have the quality of life on the Island without their dedicated service.

Guernsey is a special place to live, it is a wonderful safe space to bring up children. We have an array of activities and events to get involved in throughout the year, supported by hundreds of amazing volunteers who bring our community together. We saw this at the Island Games and more

recently, when we **celebrated our wonderful 80th Liberation Day, Guernsey at its best!** We certainly need to give our heartfelt thanks and support to all those who give so much to our Community.

It is fair to say, that my first term, working on two principal committees and many subcommittees has been extremely busy. It has been a privilege to have worked with some exceptional people, both from the public sector and the third sector, who have shared their expertise and broadened my knowledge and understanding, for which I am hugely grateful. I have had a particular passion this term, leading on Domestic Abuse and Sexual violence,

Home Affairs brought in new legislation, a pilot Sexual Assault Referral Centre and plans for a new Refuge. There is much work still to be done, and if re-elected, I would very much like the opportunity to complete this.



My Manifesto

HEALTHCARE - A Healthy Mind, Body and Soul

Our largest cost is health & social care, one of my major passions.

With a 2025 budget of £249m, inc £22m on prescription drugs + nearly another £200m spent/pending capital on hospital extensions & patient electronic records.

This is on top of Sickness Benefit.

From a total Guernsey Annual Budget of £620m - it is a pretty big chunk.

Guernseys health and social care demands are rapidly increasing, more illness, more time off work, more lives not being lived – Yet a huge percentage of illness is preventable. Wellbeing does not have to be all about what the doctor can do for you, it's also about what you can do for yourself. We need as a society to take more responsibility for our bodies, they are our most precious asset. Understanding how we manage stress, different diets and exercise all have a massive effect on our health.

Also our population is living longer lives, which is great, but that needs funding and we should make prevention of illness a part of everything we do, if we are to have any chance to make the finances for health sustainable, that's why its so important that we support 'The Health Improvement Commission' and initiatives like 'Bailiwick Social Prescribing'.

Supporting Charities - 680 Reg. Charities & NPOs in our Bailiwick (acc. to withoutus.gg), which vastly contribute to our society, for instance Gsy Mind, Grow Ltd, Autism Gsy & Gsy Alzheimer's Assoc. are invaluable, particularly over the last few years with the increase in mental illness, anxiety and stress. We should keep supporting our hard working **Charities**, along with the **Arts & Sports Committees** as they multiply the funds given and play a pivotal role in supporting long term community wellbeing.

Wellbeing Survey - recently showed 35% felt intensely lonely. 48.6% reported stress/anxiety often/always at work/education. Lets create Outdoor Hubs where people can feel connected to Guernseys vast amount of natural beauty, to socialise after sea swimming or participating in exercise to help boost their immune systems, de-stress and improve wellbeing & sanity naturally – connecting to nature = less illness.

Sickness Benefit - It's often better for a person's long-term health to be at work. To raise awareness of the Supporting Occupational Health & Wellbeing team (SOHWELL) who offer early intervention & support to people who have an illness, injury or disability to help them get back to work more quickly, contributing to society.

HOUSING CRISIS

Housing again plays a key role in health, even with AI, businesses need staff, staff need accommodation, we are lacking all types of homes, from 1st time buyers to pensioners looking to downsize.

We need to build on the land banks held by the States and developers, inc. derelict hotels and the regeneration of The Bridge (using our inert waste to help fund the project reclaiming Black Rock & moving industrial plants to Longue Hougue) it could be amazing with stunning views, make a substantial contribution to the housing shortage, with a sea swimming pool and wide walk/cycle path around the coast to Vale Castle (another ideal hub for locals & tourists) and onto Bordeaux Harbour. Keeping environment in mind, with communal gardens, play areas, creche, shops & cafes, hubs with a community vibe + a new marina that would also attract tourism, aiding the economy.

Key Workers - Free up housing presently used by key workers, let's build a large complex of affordable housing apartments near the PEH = less traffic + convenient for our busy valued health workers.

Pensioners - Want to enjoy their retirement. We need to build more care homes and retirement complexes, for both rent and ownership, with support, but also offering independence, allowing release of wealth and to free up larger homes for families ... There is hope.

The challenge is, there is not enough money in the pot, yet we need to invest in infrastructure. I'm good at balancing the books and I hate waste.

Selling our Assets - I disagree with selling our Harbour, Airport, Water, Electricity - they belong to all of us.

Empty Town Shops - if left empty too long due to extortionate rents, should be fined similar to the Derelict Buildings Amenity Notice, as should large sites left derelict which would be ideal for homes.

Entrepreneurs - Encourage Business in Guernsey. Reduce red tape inc Planning Permissions. **Uni Students** - Housing, Tax & relocation benefits to encourage them back to their families. To minimise paying agency staff, to boost our finances + importantly stop the brain drain - They are our future life blood.

CONCLUSION

- *Whilst we want Human Rights for everyone - we must also remember the Human Rights of the hard working Tax Payer.
- *We need deputies with common sense, with lived lives & experience to know what is best and what is empty promises, to know what has and hasn't worked and how we can move forward swiftly.
- *I don't have all the answers, but I have attended States meetings, many seminars & training sessions and I know what's involved.

- President of the Overseas Aid & Development Commission: Ensuring Guernsey's support reaches those most in need and proving our global values through well-managed humanitarian partnerships.
- Member of the Development & Planning Authority: With my colleagues on planning I have worked on practical reforms to make housebuilding easier whilst at the same time ensuring we protect our Island character. These include suspending barriers like GP11, issuing guidance to simplify building regulations for homes built with modern methods of construction, and working with constituents to help them overcome obstacles to new developments.
- Vice-President of the Transport and Licensing Authority: Nominally, we were responsible for determining applications for air route licenses and carrying out transport licensing and regulatory functions. However, since 2018 the requirement for air route licenses has been suspended mostly due to Open Skies policy, so I would consider suspension of this Committee to simplify States operations.

I have represented Guernsey on the BIPA (British Irish Parliamentary Association) and the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

I believe in community and giving my time. Prior to standing I was an active crew member of Channel Islands Air Search and a long-time member of the Guernsey Round Table. I am also currently an advisor and mentor for Apollo, a social enterprise empowering disadvantaged young people through activities and mentorship. I also am a member of the Guille Alles Library Council, Fairtrade and the World Aid Walk Committee.

Offshore Wind and Energy Opportunity

I have been involved in the Offshore Wind Group since its inception in March 2023 and am honoured to chair this ambitious project. It has been a privilege to work alongside a highly dedicated team (including Deputy Meerveld and Deputy de Sausmarez) supported by a solid team of officers and expert consultants, all focused on unlocking the economic potential of leasing part of our seabed to a wind developer. This is a key economic enabler:

- Assuming we develop the full 610 km² of viable seabed. Based on independent experts' calculations, the lease income could be over £150 million a year, around twice the revenue of a 5 % GST and a 10 % rise in income tax combined.
- It will diversify our economy, create skilled jobs, and stabilise future energy costs.
- It helps accelerate our journey toward decarbonisation and a cleaner, greener Guernsey.

We must move decisively, and at pace, to complete the groundwork and begin delivery. I am determined that Guernsey captures the benefits of offshore wind.

Housing: Prioritise Supply, Reform Delivery

We do not have enough homes for the people who live and work here and delays in planning, policy and delivery compound the problem. I was part of the Development & Planning Authority that **suspended clause GP11**, a well-intentioned but deeply flawed block to the delivery of private housing. Now we must:

- Embrace Modern Methods of Construction (MMC) for quicker, cheaper builds.
- Launch a States-backed Housing Scheme to unlock capital.
- Reform partial ownership rules to allow full progression to 100% ownership.
- Increase supply in the affordable, key worker and first-time buyer markets.
- Support grants and loans for young islanders.

Tax and Fiscal Responsibility: Reform First

GST is not a quick fix to our fiscal problems. I opposed it and though it has been voted through, I believe in reform first. We must collect what is owed and cut inefficiency before asking islanders to pay more:

- Review government spending before implementing GST.
- Push for zero-based budgeting across committees.
- Improve tax collection and compliance.
- Keep tax policy fair, targeted, and protective of the vulnerable.
- Stay competitive with Jersey, the Isle of Man, and key partners.

I will continue to press for government reform and value for money to build public trust.

Economic Growth: The Engine of Guernsey's Future

Economic growth is Guernsey's foundation. Without it, we cannot fund public services, solve the housing crisis, or protect the vulnerable.

As a businessman I can turn ideas into action. Guernsey needs to be faster, bolder and keenly focused on delivery. We need to support local enterprise and attract new opportunities. We must:

- Cut bureaucracy and modernise States systems.
- Invest in digital finance, Al, green tech and future industries.
- Strengthen air and sea links to drive trade and tourism.
- Promote Guernsey as a world-class visitor destination.
- Leverage our position to build partnerships with France, the UK, and the Islands.
- Unlock States contracts for local firms and entrepreneurs.

I want an economy that rewards hard work, encourages innovation and delivers growth.

Public Sector Reform and Government Efficiency

Guernsey does not need a bloated bureaucracy. It needs focused, efficient administration.

I want the States to:

- Introduce KPIs and performance targets for all departments.
- Create transparent public dashboards to track results.
- Require all new policy proposals to include more detailed cost impact assessments.
- Foster a culture of delivery by streamlining management layers.

At a political level, we need a government of purpose and urgency, not one that is paralysed by process and factions. I support exploring a move to executive-style government, one that empowers faster, transparent decision-making yet upholds Guernsey's consensus-based principles.

Population and Migration Policy

Guernsey depends on inward migration to support essential services and fill jobs, but our approach must be well-regulated, proportionate and sustainable. There has been an increase in inward migration since the removal of the Medium-Term Employment Permit and the reduction in extensions of the Short-Term Employment Permit. This has put pressure on housing and infrastructure, and it needs to change:

- The Employment Permit Policy (EPP) must be reviewed urgently to restore balance and control.
- The current system lacks the safeguards needed to manage long-term population impacts.
- Every new arrival must be a net contributor to our community and economy.
- Housing and workforce policies must be integrated to avoid unsustainable growth.
- Improved forecasting is needed to match immigration with sector needs and infrastructure capacity.

I support a fair and enforceable population management system that sustains Guernsey's economy while preserving the Island's unique character.

Commitment to Service

I am here for service, not for personal glory. I have met hundreds of constituents, attended countless meetings and supported individuals and businesses throughout the last term. I've built relationships across government and helped drive policy delivery. But I have also witnessed what holds government back and that must change. Housing and Population

Housing and population go hand in hand.

Recent relaxations in population policy have made it even harder for local residents, especially young people, to afford homes - whether buying or renting. We need much smarter population policies that balance the needs of islanders with welcoming those truly essential workers that we can't recruit locally. If we don't manage this situation, we risk a permanent housing crisis and islanders feeling forced to leave. Thankfully, several affordable housing sites are about to come online with more in the pipeline. The Guernsey Housing Plan addresses many additional

ways of improving matters, such as removing barriers to downsizing, but we can't take our eve off the ball. The emphasis now should be on getting Statesowned sites moving, either directly, with partners, or through the GHA. We should also consider compulsory purchase of selected disused hotels if they're not developed within a certain time frame

Capital Spending and **Borrowing**

The Scrutiny review I led into the States' IT contract with Agilisys laid bare real problems with how big projects are managed. Add to that, the rising cost of the hospital modernisation and Alderney runway, and it becomes clear we need to manage large capital projects much better. If re-elected, I'd like to work on Policy & Resources to make sure we have the right resources and skills in place. We can't keep wasting money by doing the same work twice. Growing up here,

with parents who lived through the war, I learned the value of living within your means and not being wasteful - lessons I'd continue to take into the States. I would, however, agree to borrowing for projects that generate an income and support the economy, such as building affordable homes for rent or partial ownership where the rental income earned covers the borrowing costs.

Education

Education was the top election issue in 2020 with the Pause and Review, but after the election the review part was dropped, and a majority of States' members voted for an expensive four-building model. Four years on, this has

resulted in our sixth form students being housed indefinitely at La Mare from this September. I didn't vote for this, but I don't think we should make further big changes now - our children and teachers have had enough disruption. There's no funding for the planned new Sixth Form Centre at Les Ozouets predicted costs have soared. Serious consideration must now be given to moving back to the existing Form Sixth Centre.

back to the existing Sixth Form Centre, suitably expanded, at Les Varendes. This would give our sixth formers more subject choices and save money which could, in turn, go towards improved attainment in core subjects as well as supporting our teachers. I believe schools should have significantly more independence — I seconded an amendment to do that but at the time the Assembly didn't agree. Promoting lifelong learning and skills development is also key to helping islanders adapt to a changing economy.

The Economy

A thriving economy is vital. Making efficiencies and savings in our public sector should be a continual process, including listening to frontline staff - they often know best where savings and improvements can be made. Even with savings, we'll still need to raise money for healthcare, infrastructure investment and rebuilding our rainy-day fund which are the three things driving the deficit. My voting record shows that I always support those who are less well-off. There'll be lots of tax ideas at this election, some better thought through than others, but my promise to you is simple: I'll only back fair tax changes that protect or improve things for low and middle earners who are already under pressure. Any system must have safeguards against future increases for these families, and the burden can't just fall on individuals. environment. They strengthen our community and fill vital gaps with practical help, solutions and compassion. The States has an important role to play in supporting them and the work they do, particularly with multi-year contracts that allow charities to plan ahead.

Health and Care

As a deputy, I have made progress by advocating for a greater move towards preventative care by investment in early intervention and health improvement. The evidence is clear: without this we risk the level of healthcare we currently enjoy, which represents nearly 40% of the States budget, becoming simply unaffordable. If elected I will keep pressing for meaningful progress in this area for both physical and mental health issues. In part, this can be achieved by expanding partnerships with charities and community groups, recognising their vital role in early intervention and wellbeing. We must also work to create personal resilience in our community, which can be eroded by the culture and pressures of modern-day life. Funding for long-term care must be made sustainable, but I don't support people having to sell their home to pay for their care.

Some of the work I'm proudest of never made the headlines — and that's okay. I'm not here for glory, I'm here to listen, do the homework, and push for changes that matter. Whether it's mental health, fairness, or speaking out when others stay silent, I've tried to make a difference — even behind the scenes.

Here's a snapshot of what I've achieved so far.

Mental Health Review

At the start of this term, I pushed for mental health to be taken seriously. It wasn't flashy or headline-grabbing — just steady, persistent pressure until a review was finally launched.

Why it matters: Too many people were falling through the cracks. When mental health is overlooked, people suffer, and we owe it to them to do better.

Campaign Expense Reform

When I saw how much some candidates were spending just to get elected, I knew it wasn't right, I challenged it.

Why it matters: If standing for election costs thousands, only the wealthy can afford to run. That excludes people from all backgrounds representing their communities, and that's not democracy.

Education 'Pause & Review'

I brought an amendment calling for the proper comparison of secondary school models to be done - so decisions could be based on evidence, not assumptions.

Why it matters: Big decisions about education need transparency, without open scrutiny we risk eroding trust.

Challenging Outdated Laws

I've spoken out against the way we criminalise young people — especially for cannabis use.

Why it matters: The damage caused by our laws often outweighs the harm of the drug itself. One conviction can derail a life — making it harder to find a job, a home, or even stay healthy. I believe in reducing harm, not punishing people unfairly.

Some of the work worth doing doesn't fit neatly into a four-year term. These are the things I'll keep showing up for — the issues I believe matter. I may not have all the answers, but I'll keep asking the right questions, pushing for fairer systems, and doing the groundwork to make progress possible.

Long-Term Care Funding

Right now, young people are paying into a system that may not be there for them. That's not fair, and it's not sustainable. We need an honest, grown-up conversation about how we fund long term care across generations.

Housing

There's no quick fix to the housing crisis — if there were, it would have been done by now. But progress is possible with stronger collaboration. A huge amount of groundwork has gone into the Guernsey Housing Plan. It's a vital foundation — and to make it work, we need closer communication between government and industry.

Fair Taxation

The weight of funding essential services can't keep falling on the same shoulders. I support practical, fair tax solutions, that may mean GST, but first I want to see corporate tax reform and the closure of income tax loopholes. Everyone should contribute their fair share.

Backing Public Servants

None of these goals are possible without the people who make them happen. I haven't seen evidence of the so-called 'bloated civil service' and the stats don't back this up either. Yes, we need smart efficiencies, but we need to support the people who keep services running. Strong public services depend on a well-resourced, respected civil service.

My experience has also helped drive improvements in school digital infrastructure, securing better procurement outcomes and greater value for taxpayers.

Looking ahead, we're on the cusp of major advancements in artificial intelligence. It's crucial we have people in the Assembly with a strong understanding of technology to help the island harness its full potential.

Throughout this term, I've been one of the few Deputies to serve on two principal committees for the full duration: Environment & Infrastructure and Education, Sport & Culture. Between them, I've contributed to 30 policy letters and countless amendments. I've shown I'm not afraid of hard work—also serving as Vice-Chair on interim school governance boards, participating in dozens of subcommittees, and recently joining the Digital Steering Group, Beau Sejour Steering Group, and St James Council. I'm pleased that, during this term, Ofsted inspections have rated the majority of our schools as at least 'Good'. It's also great to see that so many parents and students are now actively travelling to and from school, incentives such as "school streets" are allowing children to gain confidence and travel to school independently.

Through the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association and inter-island committee meetings, I've built strong, trusted relationships with politicians in Jersey, the Isle of Man, Alderney, and Sark.

Housing

Housing will be our top priority next term. To meet demand, we must embrace modern methods of construction. While several sites are already in the pipeline, developers are under pressure—facing rising material costs and labour shortages. Volumetric modular construction will play a key role in delivery, helping ease the burden on local trades until the market stabilises. Once we clear the bottleneck, it's essential that we deliver the affordable housing we already know is urgently needed. We also need to significantly expand the provision of sheltered accommodation, enabling our growing ageing population to live independently, safely, and with dignity for longer.

Early Years Education

Doubling the free Early Years Education entitlement from 15 to 30 hours is one of the smartest investments we can make—for families, the economy, and Guernsey's future. It allows parents to move from part-time roles into more secure, long-term employment if they choose to, helping to reduce underemployment and narrow the gender pay gap. It strengthens our workforce,

eases recruitment pressures, and boosts long-term tax revenue. For children, it means stronger development, better school readiness, and earlier support for special needs. Jersey understands the benefits—they've already expanded to 30 hours and are seeing the results. We risk falling behind. This isn't just about childcare—it's about educational quality, social equity, and economic resilience. Crucially, it gives young families a reason to stay in Guernsey and helps ease the financial pressures of having more children. I've consistently pushed for expanding this entitlement throughout this term—and I'll keep campaigning for it next term too.

Legalisation of cannabis

Guernsey currently has de facto decriminalisation of cannabis. Almost anyone can obtain a medical cannabis prescription, often for minor conditions. The high volume of prescriptions has fuelled a widespread diversion market—yet, contrary to past concerns, the sky hasn't fallen in. I believe the time has come to seriously explore the legalisation, regulation, and taxation of cannabis in Guernsey.











Bringing People Together

This term, I've worked to bring the Assembly together by organising events like the Swimarathon and A Drink After Work with Your Deputies. If re-elected, I'll continue to host these events—not only because they raise funds for local causes, but because they build stronger working relationships within the States. Unlike most organisations, we have no team-building budget, so these informal initiatives are doubly valuable: for community impact and for better collaboration.

I will continue to speak out for open, honest, transparent and accountable government for all islanders and voice public concerns. This includes the high cost of living, shortage of housing, unfair taxation (No to GST) and environmental pollution.

Together we can realise our full potential, protect our island heritage and embrace the natural beauty of the island and its traditions.

Education must be inclusive, equitable and promote opportunities for lifelong learning and provide the training to meet growing demands.

We need to move forward and grasp new opportunities with renewed energy to build a brighter and bolder future for Guernsey.

Call to Action

As an active Deputy having served the island community four terms I offer my experience as:

- Former Environment Minister leading in Waste Management and environmental philosophy together with service as a Member of Economic Development, Education, Legislation, Scrutiny and Transport Licensing Committees
- Consultant and advisor to international businesses and national governments
- University lecturer in economics and teacher at the secondary level

I have this term placed three requetes in the States:

- 1. to direct the Committee for Education, Sport & Culture to reinstate primary education for children for the benefit of the Herm Island community and its businesses; 2. to reduce mooring fees and ensure the States' Trading Supervisory Board consults fully with the Boatowners and the Marine Traders for a fair deal in respect of future increases; and
- to introduce a restriction preventing the general sale of glyphosate products given its impacts on our water supply and local environment

Economic Prospects

Growing and diversifying our economic base is key to increasing tax revenues and reducing the need for new taxes.

We need to promote island renewable energy and new initiatives in the finance industry. The Government's strategy for investment, innovation and growth should also include the arts, festivals, shows and events.

The States are making advances into solar and wind power but need to consider tidal energy technology as well. I formed working groups populated by States members to explore solar, wind and tidal power which resulted in scoping reports being submitted to the States on renewable energy opportunities for the **Bailiwick**. We need to be aware of the

NH1 project supported by an EU grant of 31 million Euros, which will capture tidal energy in the Alderney Race. Assembled in Cherbourg, the tidal plants will produce 34 GWh per year of clean, sustainable and predictable energy.

I will continue to oppose the introduction of GST. This tax will take two to three years to recover the cost of implementation both in staffing and equipment. It will add a cumbersome burden to everyone on the island already fighting the high cost of living. We need to reform the zero ten Corporate Tax Policy. All businesses should pay an annual tax on profits earned in Guernsey; the burden of taxation is currently falling too heavily on the individual. We must cut the tax caps to high-net-worth earners. Hikes to domestic TRP must not exceed the cost-of-living index.

Health

Health and Social Care must focus on preventative health care to reduce the risk of premature mortality. We must provide more skilled physicians, new operating theatres and modern diagnostic equipment to reduce costly interventions, and long waiting lists. At long last after my many campaigns the decision has been taken to shut down the clinical incinerator at the PEH spewing toxic fumes in the very area where people are trying to recover from serious illnesses.

There is an urgent need to increase the number of care beds to cover increasing demand. The next term of government must reform long term care and provide more choice and assistance to the elderly to remain in their homes.

Pensioners should not lose their health benefit grant for GP and nurse visits and exemption from prescription charges. Nor be forced to sell their homes for long term care.

Environment

Having campaigned for higher environmental standards since entering the States much remains to be done. Our environment is precious to our health and well-being. Contamination from firefighting foam (PFOS) and glyphosate in our drinking water still needs to be resolved. And the continual flushing of raw sewage and chemical contaminants into our coastal waters must be stopped in a comprehensive environmental clean-up.

The agricultural community has a deeprooted connection with the land and regenerative agricultural practices. They carry the responsibility of preserving the Guernsey dairy breed and dairy industry and need ongoing support. The industry has an important environmental, economic and cultural role in Guernsey.

We must protect our island from overdevelopment and protect our biodiversity. The current planning system needs reform to direct future development onto brown field sites to protect green fields from further development. Currently fields outside the agricultural priority areas (APA's) need protection. New redevelopment builds need to have their footprint reasonably contained.

Connectivity

Reliable, sustainable and affordable air and sea links are key to freedom to travel as well as capturing long and short stay holidays to our islands and to sustain our economy. I applaud the work Brittany Ferries is doing in France to promote our islands and especially Guernsey.

Our town centres need adequate parking

for residents and for the success of retail, hospitality and financial businesses. Looking forward there is need for sensitive regeneration in both St Peter Port and the Bridge. We need initiatives to promote the vibrancy and footfall in our towns. Only by working together will we pave the path for a prosperous Guernsey full of hope and opportunity for all.

Cost of Living Pressures

Wage packages and those living on fixed incomes are not keeping pace with the cost-of-living pressures on households. The government and its trading boards must consider this before hiking tariffs and charges higher than inflation. We have been subjected to unreasonable hikes and charges particularly in TRP, electricity, water and ports mooring fees without independent regulation. Until this government tightens its belt and reigns in spending there should be no further increases in taxes or new tax schemes introduced.

There is urgent need for newer initiatives to encourage local participation in work. The connection with regional universities and further education facilities provides

opportunities to many in the community to extend their horizons and skill sets. Local young people returning to the island should be provided the same benefits as new employees on license.

The shortage of housing must be overcome with programmes to encourage families onto the housing ladder. We must build affordable homes for local families and key workers through both public led schemes and private sector developments. The land is available, and the planning permissions are in place for these projects to be built and become reality. Regulation is required to address land banking preventing timely development of much needed housing and infrastructure projects.

Education

In the review of primary education next term all our existing primary schools must be retained and maintained to current standards with no closures. They maintain high standards and form an integral part of the soul of our island community.

As an educationalist, increasing class sizes, declining exam results and lack of discipline within our secondary schools are of increasing concern and has led some families turning to the private colleges. Squeezing the front-line teaching force, constant upheaval with substitute and agency staff and a growing bureaucracy is not acceptable.

Neither is converting the purpose built sixth form centre into office space and shuttling students into outdated facilities at the Mare. Our students are being denied the best education including the International Baccalaureate and this is not right.

Doing away with the States Grant to the Private Colleges is reckless for both the future of our young people and our economy. The Colleges provide excellent value for money and bring substantial benefits to the community.

What I hope to achieve next

Housing

- Deliver more affordable homes and unlock stalled developments
- Support the rental market and strengthen protection for landlords and tenants
- Support first-time buyers, downsizers and key workers

Guernsey's housing crisis has been driven by rising costs and rapid population growth. I led the development of the Guernsey Housing Plan – a strategy created with industry that's already delivering, with around 450 new affordable homes in the pipeline.

Our work to unlock stalled private developments site by site is proving effective, but to make an even bigger difference the States should establish a delivery body, such as the Housing Commission I proposed, along with a Housing Champion.

The rental sector, which houses over a quarter of our population, also needs more support. I'll continue to push for changes like removing the document duty penalty for buy-to-let, and reforming the current rent subsidy for offisland key workers so that it doesn't inflate costs for everyone and is fairer for local key workers. Carefully timed help for first-time buyers and downsizers is also part of the plan.

Health

- Invest more in prevention and make healthy lifestyles easier
- Support carers and stabilise care provision
- Improve access to mental health and community-based services

Staying healthy for longer improves quality of life and reduces long-term costs. We know this approach works for us: initiatives like School Streets, Be Active, and Eat Well are already helping Guernsey positively buck the trend in childhood weight. I'd like to expand social prescribing and other effective, community-based approaches to make it easier for people to live well and stay healthy.

I've long championed carers, both paid and informal, and more recently I have helped stabilise the care home sector through better funding. With demand for care beds rising, we must increase future capacity in those settings and provide more care in people's own homes. Mental health needs parity with physical health, supported by early intervention and accessible digital tools that enhance – not replace – human care.



Education

- Improve educational opportunities and outcomes, with greater efficiency
- Strengthen Early Years and ALN provision
- Expand vocational, digital and lifelong learning

I'm ambitious for education at every level.
As a parent of four children in state schools, I know only too well how political decisions have impacted students and teachers, and I have challenged those that have led to the bigger class sizes and reduced curriculum choice that we're seeing now. We need sensible, evidence-based decision-making about the Sixth Form Centre and other sectors that deliver the best possible outcomes for students across the island, and ensure efficient use of public funds.

I've long called for greater investment in Early Years and childcare, which is underfunded in Guernsey. This is vital not only for children's development but also for boosting workforce participation.

We also need more focus on skilled trades, apprenticeships, digital education, and policies that support our hardworking teachers to thrive.

Public Finances

- Protect essential services while investing wisely

We are in an era of global economic uncertainty, and Guernsey is under real fiscal pressure thanks to our growing dependency ratio and imbalanced tax base. We must fund key services like housing, health and education, but do so responsibly, recognising the strain already on working people, pensioners and businesses.

I'll continue advocating for strategic, evidence-based decisions that prioritise long-term sustainability, innovation, and economic productivity.

Manifesto Summary

There can be no room in the next States for pet schemes or projects, prejudices, virtue signaling, flights of fancy, wishful thinking or self-interest. Islanders have real problems which their elected representatives must sort out. Housing, the cost of living, healthcare, the exodus of our young people, our financial structural deficit and the growing gap between rich and poor. Your government should be focused on the needs of the majority of the people rather than the needs of the people with the majority of the money. The best interests of islanders and the island are inseparable.

Who am I and what do I believe in?

I was born in Guernsey and have lived here all my life. I was educated at the Vale School and Elizabeth College. I worked for 39 years in the public sector predominantly in finance (including 19 years at Home Affairs in senior finance roles, producing and managing budgets and accounts). I have an extensive knowledge and understanding of the operation of States Finances. I was also president of the AGCS branch of PROSPECT.

I am currently Senior Constable and a Douzenier for St Sampson. I also serve on a number of committees: Channel Islands Occupation Society, Retired States Employees Association (RSEA), Vintage Agricultural Show and the St Sampson's Church Property Management Board. I am a member of the campaign group HEAL (Health Equality For All) and a member of the Committee of Management of the Odd Fellows. I am also a presenter and member of the Committee for Jubilee Hospital Radio.

At heart I have been a public servant all of my adult life and I hope to be able to continue to serve you all as a Peoples Deputy following the election. The thing that really matters to me is the wellbeing of the community. This is a pragmatic view. Without a happy, healthy and secure population the economy cannot continue to function.

My hopes for the next political term

I believe that every island child has the right to a high quality standard of education regardless of ability to pay. As they grow up and leave school they should be able to aspire to full or partial home ownership according to their free choice or be able to rent a home at a truly affordable cost. They should be able to confidently raise a family here if they wish. In their old age they should be able to enjoy a comfortable secure retirement. Throughout their lives they should have access to health care and good public services fit for the 21st century. Most crucially at no time in their lives should they feel obliged to leave their island home because they simply cannot afford to stay here, and in their retirement they should not be forced to become medical tourists in the UK. An increasing number of our young people are leaving the island never to return. This is detrimental to the island in so many ways.

It is self-evident that huge numbers of islanders are struggling to make ends meet, house themselves, keep themselves warm in winter, feed and clothe themselves or even remain in the island. The day to day problems that haunt islanders of all ages are inter-related and need to be viewed holistically. They ultimately make the island an uncompetitive jurisdiction and if unchecked will destroy the local economy as well as placing intolerable strains upon individuals and families:

HOUSING – The cost of housing here is generally unaffordable. Using the term 'Affordable Housing' to describe housing which is clearly not is insulting to those who are well aware of the truth - the homeless and huge numbers of islanders that simply find themselves in a poverty trap. Actual progress must be made during this next term. There are many levers which could be explored - rent control for example which might initially see a contraction of the rental market but could also drive down the cost of and increase the supply of homes for purchase. It is in place in Jersey where housing costs have reduced by 0.6% in the year ending 31st March 2025. Guernsey's housing costs have increased by 7.8% in the same timeframe. Everything must be considered, better more cost-effective land purchase options for social housing, direct employment of labour and purchase of materials and plant at source if local supply chains are not adequate. The island is gradually dying as a community and our economy is being threatened by the high cost of just existing here. The new States has an overarching responsibility to stabilise and then drive down the cost of housing. Any States scheme such as tax breaks or document duty reduction must, given the States ongoing Structural Deficit, be fully costed with funding identified and must not just effectively prop up the present over inflated property market.

THE COST OF LIVING – Without doubt the cost of living here in Guernsey is high. Inflation also remains high particularly compared to Jersey our nearest comparative and competitor jurisdiction: Quarter 1 2025 RPI in Jersey 2.3%, in Guernsey 4.2% almost double! This is in part driven by the cost of housing but the States itself either directly, or via its trading entities actively fuels inflation. Examples would be Electricity and Water charges together with fuel and excise duties.

For the last 3 years from 1 July 2022 electricity tariffs here have increased by 9%, 13% & 10% - a compound 35% rise (OVERATHIRD). RPIX for the June quarter of these same years, measured the day before each successive increase in electricity charges, used to uplift State (Old Age) Pensions on the 1st of January six months after each electricity tariff rise was 7%, 6.8% & 4.5%, cumulatively 19% i.e. a full 16% less than the electricity tariff increases that State Pensioners

and other low income households have had to bear. In reality the situation is even worse. The single pensioner sitting in the one room they can barely afford to heat presently pays 23.89p per kwh and a standing charge of £68.25 whilst a person heating their entire home with an electric boiler or heat pump pays 12.24p per kwh and a standing charge of £11.41. The person huddled in their one room is effectively subsidizing the person with an electric boiler or heat pump.

HEALTHCARE — We do have excellent healthcare services. One major difficulty is affordability on an individual basis. There are many islanders who through no fault of their own find themselves unable to access primary healthcare or fall off society's financial cliff edge often in old age. This can have catastrophic results for the physical and mental health of the individuals concerned going forward. Your wealth should not determine your health.

These three issues are of great concern for and have significant impact on the majority of islanders. The States should always work to reduce the local cost of living **not** increase it. The electorate are suffering **now**. The most recent Guernsey & Alderney Well Being Survey showed that 35.6% of islanders have experienced a significant amount of stress in the past year. This is hardly surprising.

OTHER ISSUES

GLOBAL WARMING AND RISING SEA

It is self evident that sea levels and the temperature of the planet are rising. It is also clear that whatever we do here on the island will have a miniscule effect worldwide on either of these issues. That's definitely not to say we should as a community do nothing, but as an island which has significant densely populated low lying areas, including large areas below sea level, we must spend adequate amounts on coastal defences. This will not be cheap but it must be done. It should also be recognized by our elected assembly that so called 'green' taxes are still taxes and taxes make people poorer at a time when 'in work' poverty is steadily rising. The high tide mark of relative poverty has reached a huge number of islanders.



OUR AIR AND SEA LINKS

Since 2020 our position has worsened. Effectively we now have one (States owned) airline which lost around £100million in public ownership prior to 2020 plus massive one-off losses during the pandemic. The airline continues to lose money on a grand scale. It also has a recent history of unreliability and is very expensive to fly with, again most crucially when compared to services of our nearest competitor jurisdiction. Sea travel and freight is now dependent upon two relatively old vessels which are presently only due to be 'refreshed' over the next 15 years. The fast craft will be 40 years old and the Ro-Pax vessel will be 35 years old by the end of the current contract if not replaced. Jersey by contrast is to have three new vessels in the not to distant future. The next States cannot afford to take its eye off these issues.

EDUCATION

The issue of tax-payer funding the three private colleges has been 'put to bed' by the present States. The colleges are to receive a fixed sum per pupil regardless of the financial position of the parents. The period of notice to change this arrangement is longer than a States term. Crucially what still remains to be addressed is the perception that drives parents to in many cases beggar themselves or have multiple jobs to put their children into the colleges. If improvements are required in the State sector they must be driven forward in the next political term. Our young people represent the island's future. We cannot afford to let them down. In pure fiscal terms this needs to be addressed even more urgently now as every additional pupil in the private colleges now means that the taxpayer funded grant goes up.

THE EXODUS OF OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

It is a fact that our young people are leaving the island in droves. It's hardly surprising. It is uncompetitively expensive to live here. Everything the next States do should concentrate on improving the lot of the population not making it worse. In particular for our young people.

THE GAP BETWEEN RICH AND POOR

The increasing gulf between the very well off and the average and poor is a show stopper for the island. It's not fair or equitable but just as crucially again drives people away from the island. The result being that there are less and less people left to make the island function.

OUR STRUCTURAL DEFICIT

This is a reality. We have been eating into our financial reserves steadily for years. The next States must resolve this once and for all. We need people in place who will not 'kick the can down the road'. Push has come to shove. The next States have the ability to either run the island into the ground or sort things out. It won't be easy or palatable but it must be done. We are rapidly approaching 'one minute to midnight' as far as our public finances go. Again we owe it to our young people to sort this out. Now. Successive States have lead us to believe that economic growth alone may get the island out of the red. It hasn't happened and mindful of the financial instability of the world

due to present US government policy it's even less likely to happen now. Likewise whilst in the medium to long term an offshore wind farm for example might drastically improve the island's situation it will do nothing straight away. It's also largely dependent on the UK's Contract for Difference (CfD) policy (It is self evident that a harsh wind of financial and electoral reality is blowing round the Secretary of State for Energy Security & Net Zero). Many sure fire winners have fallen by the wayside over the years – the babaco (savior of the growing industry), the casino (savior of the tourist industry), the data park that never was and our cannabis industry. Finally of course savings targets are not savings until the savings have been delivered. Projecting savings of say £25 million per year by 2029 means absolutely nothing unless the savings materialise and of course what shape would public services and public infrastructure be in if they were achieved? Food and medical bills should definitely be exempt from any increase in indirect taxation.

THE THIRD SECTOR

Guernsey relies heavily on charitable organizations for many of our vital services. Both morally and financially the States needs to nurture the third sector. States of Guernsey contributions over the last ten years have remained static at around £5million per annum. There is an urgent need for the new States to

review and increase the real term value of the States contribution to put Third Sector organisations on a stable footing going forward. In addition it is imperative that if new taxes are enacted adequate mitigations are put in place to protect the Third Sector. Finally of course charities rely heavily on the older generation for volunteers. At present older volunteers are just not being replaced.

PETITION LAW

It is clear that there continues to be general public dissatisfaction with the way that States members interact with and listen to the public between elections. Government should be there to govern however it should also listen to the electorate other than for a few weeks prior to each election. I would support the introduction of a petition law as in Jersey and the UK (Thresholds – Jersey 1,000 signatures = ministerial response & 5,000 signatures = consideration for States debate, UK 10,000 signatures = response from government & 100,000 signatures = consideration for parliamentary debate)

I have worked in the island's pension industry for the past 20 years, most recently employed as a director for a leading financial services firm, and hold qualifications in International Trust Management and Governance, Risk and Compliance. I am passionate about working hard to find solutions for all of the issues our island is currently experiencing, and am focused on fixing Guernsey's economy, researching fresh ideas to help address our housing crisis, and also doing everything possible to facilitate the quick completion of the States schools building and renovation plans. If elected, I will work closely with my fellow deputies to resolve the problems our Island is facing NOW.

DYNAMIC BUSINESS ENVIRONMENT: Guernsey is struggling with a high cost-of-living and inflation and hampered in its ability to complete vital projects due to financial pressures. To grow our way out of this situation we must optimise provision of support to business so that we are doing everything within our power to attract -and retain- employers who will help us achieve the economic stability we so badly need. Guernsey must modernise our civil service structures to improve their efficiency, and also review the Island's appetite to risk to show companies looking to operate here that Guernsey has a dynamic approach to business. We must also focus on ways to diversify our industry base and increase support for entrepreneurs.

FINANCES AND TAXATION: The island's credit rating was downgraded by the S&P rating agency in 2 consecutive years during the Assembly's last term. They said a squeeze on public finances would be caused by our shrinking working age population, threatening tax collection rates and increasing pressure on health and care services. They also warned of further downgrades if Guernsey failed to implement tax reforms to stabilise its funding needs. S&P's independent appraisal of the island's finances and economic outlook is a warning we would be foolish to ignore. Things need to change, we must raise more money through taxation.

I have read with interest suggestions that Pillar 2 might generate sufficient income to allow us to forego further taxation. Similarly, of plans to introduce zero-15, if it could be agreed jointly with Jersey. I would caution that these possible solutions should not be relied upon to provide the income levels we need today.

After closely studying the competing proposals, GST-plus seems to be the fairest way that has been suggested to strengthen the island's future financial position – providing as it does protections for pensioners and lower earners. If elected, I will judge any alternative proposal to a goods and sales tax on its merits – but I will not allow the decision on increasing taxation to be moth-balled, as I believe that leaving this difficult choice any longer will damage our reputation and lead to tougher actions being needed as we near the end of the decade.

EDUCATION: The Island's children have borne the brunt of the experiment to end selection without adequate preparation for a post 11-plus school system. The States must guarantee that the school renovation and building works are completed swiftly to provide a stable learning environment where our children can get the very best experience, as well as the support they need to excel during their school life on the island.

Our children are the Island's future and need to be given every encouragement to embrace post-high school education - be that through A levels at the Sixth Form Centre or much needed skills for local industry through vocational studies and apprenticeships at The Guernsey Institute/College of Further Education.

HOUSING: The States needs to work quickly with developers to provide affordable housing for our lower earners and young people, or risk seeing them move away. Work must begin swiftly on the Bridge flood defences to enable progress with Leale's Yard and GHA sites in the area, as failure to build has had a negative impact on the market and helped create the high rate of inflation that affects the rents and mortgage rates we pay. This must also include well-built and maintained States housing which is a vital safety net when local families need this kind of support from our community.

In an island with property shortages too many buildings are left vacant, and I would support discussions with landlords who allow properties to fall into disrepair over a sustained period. I would also look at measures to make it financially unviable for owners to leave properties empty and undeveloped for many years.

I will apply to sit on the new Housing Committee and will work fast with colleagues to free-up the barriers

preventing the creation of much needed homes that are in harmony with our island while also solving the housing crisis that impacts on so many other areas of our daily life.

HEALTH: There are many challenges on the horizon related to the island's aging population, and I support the preventative measures already begun which focus on non-medical treatments, and which promote healthy eating and active lifestyles for elderly islanders. We must build on the great work done here and also in the fight against smoking and obesity affecting all ages to help prevent chronic ill-health, which in turn results in time off work, adding to the island's financial burden.

We have a good healthcare system with excellent treatment available for all at the PEH, but I believe that we need to better fund primary care to better assist those who struggle to afford healthcare. The £12 grant for GP visits needs to be increased to help islanders seek early diagnosis; when it was first Introduced in 1992, the grant accounted for 50% of the cost for a GP visit; today it is closer to 15% of the cost to see a doctor.

ISLAND CONNECTIVITY AND AURIGNY: Guernsey's connectivity is crucial to islanders, and also to our ability to remain relevant in the business world. The Condor/Brittany Ferries agreement was not without its challenges, but has already boosted our tourism industry with increased visitor numbers.

Aurigny staff are hard-working and dedicated, but issues outside of their control have contrived to make the airline expensive and unreliable since the decision to take it under States ownership. The island may be too small to run a commercial airline; in which case we should look for a partner-firm with more aircraft and maintenance facilities to service the various routes. We learned recently that extending the runway will not necessarily attract budget airlines and should not even be considered before resurfacing is required in 10 years' time. Something needs to done, as a business making £8million losses a year is simply unsustainable.

GREEN ENERGY PLAN: With our abundant natural resources and the largest tidal flows in Europe, Guernsey is perfectly placed to become a world-leading example of how to generate clean, low-cost electricity. I would like to see the island work with specialists in the fields of renewable energies with a view to achieving energy self-sufficiency. I believe we should explore raising the funds required for development of this industry through private investment opportunities, much like the highly successful Energy Co-operative groups in Spain.

Manifesto Summary

I am standing for the States of Guernsey after a first term in the States to continue what I have been working on from 2020.

I come at this as an exponent of smaller government, with a view to reining in excessive regulation and wasteful spending which, inevitably, leads to higher taxes and lower growth in our economy. Sometimes, I do feel like King Canute in terms of holding back regulation.

I am a firm libertarian. Traditional liberties, freedom of speech, due process, freedom from government overreach, privacy and living ones life with dignity and respect must not be forgotten in the flurry of other issues that face us.

CV

I attended Poole Grammar School and read law at Downing College, Cambridge. Having qualified as a solicitor, I have worked as a partner of an international law firm and as a consultant to Mourants and am a director of an investment group. I have 3 adult daughters and 7 grandchildren.

I spent 4 years on the Public Accounts Committee (2012-2016) and was elected as a People's Deputy in 2020 where I served on the Development and Planning Committee and the Scrutiny Management Committee. I chaired the Legislation Review Panel and was a member of the Offshore Wind Sub Committee. This experience has given me a pretty good insight into the issues facing us.

Spending

We have challenges arising from excessive expenditure and recruitment into our civil service. Numbers in public administration have now drawn ahead of our core finance sector. This direction of travel must be reversed. We now have a new head of the civil service. It will be the job of those elected to the Policy and Resources Committee to work with him to achieve efficiencies and savings and we, the Deputies, must stop passing more and more UK style laws which add the need for more and more staff. With a staff turnover of around 10% p.a., we are not talking of mass firings, non replacement will cover it in areas where we can. Plus a prohibition on creating new positions.

A few specifics:

- ...I had challenged £13m in the 2025 budget for new vehicles. That's an awful lot of vehicles.
- ..We could pursue combining the two fire services together, possibly with the ambulance service.

- ...If we could cooperate with Jersey, we really need only one air traffic control system to cover the Channel Islands.
- ..Consultancy contracts must be cut back. Some are very useful. Many are pointless. Some are commissioned for purely political purposes and are entirely useless.
- ..Nursing costs are rendered artificially high by the fact that we have insufficient nursing accommodation in the vicinity of the hospital. This makes retention of nursing staff challenging leading to use of agency staff at eye watering cost. I will deal with this below under Housing.

I could go on. This is an area that must be addressed in the next States. Everything must be challenged. Dep Vermeulen and I did bring a proposal to reduce the post inflation 2025 budget by 4.7%. That received 11 votes but failed. However, I am now seeing candidates suggesting a variation on that theme being an annual real terms cut of 1%. Maybe that approach might succeed in achieving a majority.

Tax

We must remain a competitive financial centre. Everyone, particularly Jersey, wants to "eat our lunch" so we must be very careful indeed in raising taxes both from the point of view of competitiveness internationally and from the point of view of burdening our own people. As a general rule, we cannot "tax our way to growth" as the UK is now finding out to its cost. There are some taxes/ fees that can raise further revenue relatively easily, but not many. Dep Kazantseva Miller and I brought a proposal to raise annual Companies Registry fees somewhat to at least cover inflation since the last reset. This could be expanded somewhat. The finance sector

has, broadly, not objected. Re corporate tax Deputy Parkinson has raised very well argued proposals for a territorial tax similar to Hong Kong at a rate of Zero/15. This is a complex area which will require very detailed discussion with the finance sector at a very granular level. This could be very significant and should be studied. We have already signed up to Pillar II of the OECD Tax Convention. This, theoretically is raising between £10m to £30m pa from Jan 1, 2025. We shall see in due course. We also have the potential for substantial income from leasing our seabed for offshore wind development. To sum up, we must follow through all of

the above before thinking of implementing GST. This is a last resort which I have voted against at least four times. To approve GST without first dealing with spending will simply mean not doing what is necessary.

Housing

Obviously, this derives from a serious supply v demand problem exacerbated by building costs. I will deal with demand below. On the supply side, the States has rather failed to get much built in terms of social housing and key worker housing with little built in the last five years. The States MUST put its enormous land bank to good use. However, the plans to start building on the Kenilworth site seem to be progressing and an overall master plan, roads, green spaces etc across the main sites has been drawn up. It is legitimate to borrow to progress these sites as they will generate an income. Eight new sites for housing at the edge of the main and local centres are coming through in the current IDP review. We need affordable housing to buy including partial ownership units built by the GHA. Nursing accommodation is also a priority in terms of recruitment and in terms of reducing pressure on the local market which pushes up rents.

In the private sector, construction has been running at a little over 100 units pa. Not enough but this was held back for years by GP11 (the IDP rule that required sites for over 20 houses to donate up to 30% of the buildable area to social housing). Predictably no large private site came forward in nearly 8 wasted years. I spent nearly 4 years of aggravation trying to get this changed. It now has been with an overwhelming vote in the Assembly and the larger private sites are now coming forward. I think this has been my greatest achievement in this Term.

Cost is still an issue and young families struggle to raise a deposit. To assist with that, I PROPOSE A PLAN to allow first time house buyers to apply their secondary pension plan pot towards the deposit with provisions to pay it back in at a later date. I think that is a neat solution that I have seen applied elsewhere.

Immigration

This is the other side of the housing issue. Numbers coming into the island on 3 and 8 year licences seem to be rising and the target annual population increase of 300 pa (itself high) has been exceeded in recent years. We need an urgent review of just how many 8 year licences are issued and the salary threshold bearing in mind these licensees can bring family members with them. We should also require health checks on those seeking residence, medical insurance and proof of adequate means. That is standard in most places.

Open Market

This is a vital part of our fabric and needs to be encouraged. The Population Management Law passed in a previous States term imposed unfortunate restrictions on who may occupy open market homes, broadly limiting it to one family plus a lodger. This not only damaged the usefulness of the open market but also pushed numerous renters out and on to the local market thus adding even more to the cost pressures there. That should be reviewed urgently.

Capital Expenditure / Growth ————

This will require careful prioritisation in terms of what is affordable and the limitations on our actual capacity to build without causing yet more price inflation. We are committed to the Institute so that must proceed. Housing is vital as is nursing accommodation on or close to the PEH site. The extension to the PEH cannot proceed right now. It will require 150 or more new staff and we simply can't house them.

We need investment around the harbours for both flood defences and to enable business development. The Guernsey Development Authority must be allowed to proceed with that in a commercial, cost effective way.

We need to take a serious second look at an EMAS (Engineered Materials Arrest System) at the Eastern end of the runway. Our current connectivity is damaging to our hospitality and finance sectors and very expensive for Islanders. A connection to Heathrow would be ideal and may be feasible, possibly even without EMAS. I favour keeping Aurigny but it will need to adjust somewhat.

At the end of the day, we must grow our economy and do everything possible to support our key finance and hospitality sectors and to develop new lines of business if we are to have a prosperous future. Currently our economy is flatlining, if not slipping.

Education

The bright spot on this is our new Institute which will start building soon. We should give our youngsters great options to stay and study in Guernsey, especially in those practical and technical areas where we

have such high demand.

I regret the disruption caused by the termination of the Grammar School which has led to a difficult period for our States secondary school pupils. We must now concentrate on raising standards in our secondary schools with consideration given to looking at models other than the UK and to devolve as much autonomy to each individual school as possible. We must continue to work with the Colleges who educate over 30% of our pupils. The grants should certainly be retained. I supported that in the recent debate. Further, Dep Matthews and I have brought forward a proposal for means tested scholarships to the Colleges for less well off pupils. We plan to pursue that.

Environment / Net Zero —

We need to continue to reduce our energy consumption and generally become more sustainable, but only in a gradual, economic way that does not push up energy prices and electricity bills. Net zero is probably unachievable. We should not try to push ahead on that whilst 80% of the world economy is still using fossil fuels with no intention of stopping. Our big contribution to clean energy will be to push forward with plans to lease our seabed for wind farm installation. The plans will not involve us taking on economic risk: they will only involve acting as lessor of our seabed to others who will take on the building project and enter into the relevant contracts with the UK or France. The planning on this has advanced well and must be pursued. I would like to improve cycleways to include segregated cycle paths around the south, west and north coasts, planned to keep pedestrians, bikes and cars apart so far as practicable. We must continue to protect our green areas.

It has been a great honour and privilege to serve as People's Deputy for the last 4 years and 8 months. I believe being a States member is a full-time job if done properly, but not a career. Following my election last year I have worked hard on 3 States Committees. My work as Vice-President of Scrutiny, including many public hearings, has helped shape policy, brought valuable accountability and transparency and given me valuable insight into how the States does (and does not) function. This knowledge and experience would be a vital asset in what is going to be a particularly challenging new States term where we must prioritise the island's economy and housing needs.

I am not going to use these pages (or even 4 pages) making promises or pledges that, as we have seen time and again, no candidate alone can deliver within our current consensus system of government. **We need a fresh approach to politics.** And, more than ever in this next term, an Assembly which can represent the full cross section of society, working together in the island's best interests.

We can tinker with systems of government all we like, but ultimately providing the best service to and services for islanders comes down to what we can achieve collectively. That is why I was the only States member last Autumn to back all the different tax proposals, to help revitalise our economy. **Compromise.** Instead, we ended up with an unfunded budget for 2025. A situation that must be addressed immediately. Because a majority of the Assembly is needed to approve any key policy. **To make things happen.**

Just a few examples are the vital support we agreed for our key dairy industry this year, put forward by the Environment & Infrastructure Committee on which I serve. And the island's electricity strategy - paving the way for more sustainable forms of energy in future, such as offshore wind. Thus, securing a brighter greener future for us all.

I have maintained good relations with all my colleagues, despite differing views and opinions. If we work together and engage with stakeholders and the community in the right way we can achieve great things. Clearly, we need some fresh faces and impetus in the next Assembly, but also **decisive leadership**, **political experience**, **and effective communication**.

When I last stood, I said a vote for me would be a Vote for Change. And the island's business community, industry and third sector are also now saying "Change is needed." - Redeploying resources to where they will have the greatest impact
- Being ambitious but realistic.

I remain an independent candidate, one keen to work with others, who has forged a good relationship with the Forest parish, in which I am fortunate to live. If elected, I will also continue to take on constituency work from across the island as I have done this term and **work hard** for you, the people of Guernsey.

- Minimal building on green fields while there are brown field sites available
- To challenge the prescriptive Strategic Land Use Plan
- A change of regulation around flats above
 Town shops to help rejuvenate the High Street
- To value and maintain the environment and green spaces for the enjoyment and wellbeing of all

I promise to work conscientiously on my responsibilities, constituency work and preparation for debate, driven by conscience, values and common sense.

I did not support the formation of a new Housing Committee but I will get fully behind it and bring challenge on the issues outlined above.

Tax and The Economy

I have never voted for GST which is due to commence in July 2027. Whether or not that resolution of the States survives, there is a need for broader tax reform where we are not just increasing the burden on individual Guernsey residents over and again.



Personal Statement

It is rightly said that we must never forget our history when making decisions for our future.

The history in Guernsey of my branch of the Ferbrache family goes back centuries. It is typified though by the efforts of my 3-x great grandfather Daniel Ferbrache (1782-1851). Dr Rose-Marie Crossan, a local historian and author, kindly sent me details of his life when she was researching a work about some well-known figure of the day. My ancestor worked for that gentleman as a day labourer, but eventually went off to sea and sailed the World. His maritime adventures ended when the vessel he was sailing in was captured by a French privateer off Cuba. So back he came to Guernsey, married and had eleven children. He worked at a variety of jobs, was entrepreneurial, and through his efforts bought two houses and land at Les Dunes. He thus showed the characteristics that are 'Guernsey' – he was driven, adventurous, hardworking, and aspirational.

My own humbler journey has taken me from Vauvert Infants to Amherst Junior School, Elizabeth College, Law School, being a lawyer in England, and then returning to Guernsey and becoming an Advocate, a profession I have enjoyed for forty-four years. I had far less children than my ancestor, a mere four plus seven grandchildren who all live here.

Those values that my ancestor had still run through the veins of many Guernsey people, and were evidenced in abundant measure by the generation that had to endure the Occupation.

Aims

I want those values to continue. I want people who live here to be aspirational. To do that they must live in an environment where they think that is possible.

When I was a young man, although I had little money, I always presumed if I worked hard I would own my own home. Lots of young people, without the advantage of the bank of Mum and Dad no longer feel they will ever be able to do that. We must change that and we can.

I have been a States Member for fifteen years. I have served on a number of Committees and been President of four of them. I looked back to my 2020 Manifesto and three of the core principles that I wrote then apply just as much now so I repeat them.

- **1.** We facilitate an environment where creativity, productivity and success are allowed and applauded.
- **2.** We allow the elderly who have worked hard to retain their own home.
- **3.** We facilitate equality of opportunity with the aim that we can do things, and whatever peoples' talents we equalise up and not down. We encourage people to, wherever possible, create their own opportunities unhindered by States interference.

Moving Forward and Looking Back

When I became President of Policy & Resources in October 2020 we were all having to endure the greatest restrictions to our civil liberties since the Second World War. For sixteen months it was my duty to lead the small group of politicians who were on a daily basis making decisions that impacted greatly on the lives of all Islanders. We as a community survived that. It was a true honour to help in that process.

Another great honour, probably the greatest of my life, was to attend at the Cenotaph in November 2021 as the first Guernseyman to lay the wreath on behalf of the whole Bailiwick in memory of all those who sacrificed their lives so that we can enjoy the freedoms that we have.

During the lifetime of this Assembly we had to conclude the actions that were necessary as a result of Brexit. We also had to rebuild our economy and do things that bettered the lives of our citizens. We managed some initiatives but not enough. We managed to secure an Agreement with Sure which means that our internet capabilities will be much enhanced. We managed to enter into a Reciprocal Health Agreement with the UK.

We also had to seek to repair our finances which had been in a poor state for years. That was neither an easy nor popular task. It was always easy but never realistic to say that the problem never existed or was not as bad as it is. That though, as sad as it is, does not accord with reality. Although I support the Wind Farm initiative and Corporate Tax Reform – the first will

not produce any revenue for many years, and the second has not been quantified, and neither together are likely to meet the fiscal structural deficit we have. We need money now to pay the bills and repair our neglected infrastructure. As an example, our harbours need millions spent on them. Anyone who tells you there are easy answers is misleading you.

So what do we do to change things?

1. We need to provide people with hope and that starts with housing. There is no easy or quick solution, but we can do things now that will help. We can de-list the Heritage listing in respect of the Castel Hospital and release that for homes. We should purchase sites such as Leale's Yard if available, put in the required infrastructure, and make it available for local residents to develop their own homes.

We should come up with a structure to facilitate affordable loans to young prospective local home owners.

We should relax and simplify yet further our planning laws.

- 2. We need to find a way of funding our long-term health and care needs. We may well need to consider certain types of compulsory insurance.
- **3.** We need to ensure that 'middle Guernsey', who seem always to have to shoulder any extra tax charges, are protected and the burden falls as far as possible elsewhere.

- **4.** We live in a beautiful Island so the Environment needs to be protected. We can do that whilst building the houses we need.
- 5. We must invest more in our less than satisfactory infrastructure. I led politically the creation of the Guernsey Development Agency. Its path of acceptance was a rocky one, but now its value in the development of our infrastructure is recognised, and it must be given all the tools it needs whilst keeping it away from the heavy hand of the States.
- 6. We need to realise that procedures, rules, and regulations have no natural beauty, and should only be continued or enacted if absolutely necessary. I said this last time, and it still applies. Too many States Assemblies have little regard to the principle that you have to earn money before you can spend it.
- **7.** We have to re-look at what the States can provide. We need to cut down on waste.
- 8. We need to encourage our main industries such as Finance, Tourism and Retail. When we were considering tax reform we wanted to put a tax on the imports via UK and other providers. We were advised we could not do that without a consumption tax of our own. So if one is introduced we could help retailers, if they are operating fully retail premises, by giving them some relief against T.R.P.

Space does not permit me to say more, so I end with two comments.

Firstly we will only be able to achieve even some of the necessary measures needed if we change our structure of Government. We need less Deputies and we need a more purposeful form of Government that can make decisions.

Secondly, this is Guernsey. We always have and always will overcome with effort our challenges. We must continue to reach for the stars and not for our bootlaces.

Manifesto Summary

GST is Unfair – We Must Find Another Way

There may have to be tax raises, because keeping Guernsey from falling down is expensive, but GST is an unfair tax. No taxes should added to food or to fuel - eating healthily and heating your home is expensive enough.

There are big global changes to corporate taxes on the way, which will increase Guernsey's tax take by the end of 2027 – meanwhile, we need government working to make more and better paid jobs for people from the island. The States must work together, in the committees, and in meetings, and with business, to make opportunities for Guernsey businesses.

Hard No to Homelessness

Everybody should have a home which is safe and affordable, and we must act together to make sure everybody does. Everybody wants young people to be able to buy their own homes, and everybody wants enough housing for young adults to get to choose to stay on the island if that's what they want. Making sure everyone is properly housed must be a priority for the next States.

The best guess for how many people are sofa-surfing or overcrowded or haven't got a secure place is approximately 1100 – some of them will be children. Government must work urgently with the third sector to sort out emergency housing.

No Frittering

We need to raise hundreds of millions to build the sixth form centre and the hospital and develop the East Coast – let's use the £2.5 million earmarked for a Victor Hugo centre on something more urgent.

We need to get all taxes collected within a tax year of tax returns. The tax department needs to clear the backlog.

Housing -Let's Get It Together

Almost 1 in 11 homes are not available for ordinary people to live in. Are they second homes, or holiday lets, or homes too big or too small for families who need them? Empty housing should be taxed, to encourage owners to either rent or sell it.

Cost of Housing

Rents are too high because there are not enough homes. We must make sure that housing licences are issued only for the numbers of houses we have.

Housing that makes people ill. We should find out how many properties have damp or other problems that make people ill, and the States should consider guaranteeing loans to repair accommodation. If properties are not

repaired to a reasonable standard, the States should either buy them or manage their sale, for part owned housing or rental. We should involve our communities island wide in decision making through citizens' assemblies. Each parish would find volunteers and send representative citizens to consider planning matters which plainly lie close to people's hearts.

Where and how do we build houses? If people come together from all over the island and think about a wide range of information, then they can decide whether to build publicly owned housing for a range of tenants, with fair but reviewable rents and long term leases, or non-profit housing co-operatives where residents partly own and manage the buildings.



Make More Homes More Healthy

Education – Let's Consult Parents and Keep Teachers

Let's get the new Education Law done following full consultation with parents and teachers and deputies.

Parents should have a choice of secondary schools.

We must hold on to teachers, especially in core subjects. I want to set up an independent Teachers' Champion to deal with straightforward complaints, that could be fixed within a fortnight.

The States needs to show that it is screening all children for SEND by the end of Year 2, so we know those children are getting the help they need.

The **numbers of children** hitting maths and literacy milestones should also be published at the end of Year 2. These **numbers** should be shown for every year group as they progress to show students are staying on track.

We need to have better lifelong chances to re-take GCSEs or do functional skills qualifications. Our two biggest employment areas are construction and finance, and both need maths.

Health – We Can Build the Hospital and Improve Mental Health

We must finish the hospital build, and we must deal with the lasting effects of Covid on physical and mental health.

The mental health problems are especially bad among young people. We need to make sure we have **rock solid 24/7 support for mental health crises**, so that anyone at that point can telephone for immediate help.

We need to build a **Get Happy Get Great Mental Health** programme for the island,
with more free sports and activities,
especially for younger people. Active
cooperation between the States and
Guernsey's brilliant Third Sector can do
great work on this.

Guernsey has a golden future – let's get it done.

Introduction

Housing solutions should prioritise permanent residents, especially the homeless and young people, while employment opportunities must offer liveable wages to the people of Guernsey first. Our education system needs stability, with teachers remaining throughout the school year, and we must challenge financial waste and demand greater accountability. Urgent reform is also needed in our travel and tourism systems. Above all, those who live here permanently deserve a stronger voice in the states and a fairer tax system.

Let's Get the Truth About Our Finances

There is a plethora of contradicting information available publicly, regarding the financial situation in Guernsey. There should be clear, concise and factual information made available which addresses not only the "black hole" but also investments which have been made with tax payers' money. Let's get some real transparency and make the information both understandable and accessible for the average person. The average tax payer!! Only then... can we decide priorities and make things happen.

Standing Up for Our Island

Our island needs strong leadership, decisive action and the courage to do what is right, not merely what is easy. I am ready to work, to listen, and to advocate for the real changes our community deserves. I will remain true to my values, prioritise people over politics and never give up on the vision of a better future for all.

Better Care, Fair work and Training

We need higher standards in Health and Social Care, especially for our most vulnerable. Complaints, bullying, and whistleblowing must be taken seriously, no matter who is involved. Those who speak up should be protected and swift action must follow when things go wrong. I would campaign for a change in policy that would provide an independent reviewer with the authority to undertake independent investigation and ensure that best practice is not just recommended but demanded.

All care workers, including agency staff, must be properly vetted. This protects the public and safeguards the many excellent carers that are already doing vital work.

Our heavy reliance on imported labour is unsustainable. It's costly, often unfair and leaves local talent on the sidelines. Permanent residents should be first in line for jobs. If we're offering generous packages to attract workers from elsewhere, then the wages of permanent residents must be fair enough to compete, particularly when it comes to affording a home. Everyone able to work should be supported into employment.

When skills are lacking, we must offer accessible and affordable training. Guernsey has talented people of all ages and from all walks of life. Let's stop overlooking the capable and promotable pool of talent already in the Island. Let's encourage our young to return from university to their home island because Guernsey can offer them long, successful and rewarding careers. It's time to invest in our own people, not just in Health and Social Care, but across every sector.

Too Many People, Not Enough Homes

Firstly, we must prioritise permanent residents. Young people trying to build their futures, and above all, those who are homeless.

Imagine not knowing where you'll sleep tonight. On an island like ours, this is unacceptable.

We can't afford to continue to wait for years, dealing with delay and indecision. Our homeless community needs secure and permanent accommodation now.

As a temporary step, I believe we must pause all non-essential inward migration. Our infrastructure simply cannot cope with the current rate of arrivals. Let's focus on housing those already here.

The States' decision to bring in large numbers of workers without preparing for the housing impact has left many renters vulnerable, living with the constant fear of eviction and nowhere else to go. Thats the harsh reality for too many people.

Let's make use of some of the sites already owned by the States of Guernsey, instead of selling, we could consider sites like Swissville, Garden Hill and Lukis House for re-development. Not forgetting the fact that Castel Hospital has the potential for 90 homes and 100 apartments. What are the barriers? Let's remove them and get on with it.

My Priorities

Whilst I am passionate about protecting vulnerable people, I am not a one-issue candidate. Guernsey is facing serious challenges, and I believe in tackling them head-on. Our island is overpopulated, and wages must rise so Islanders can fairly compete for housing. We must explore fair and progressive taxation options, without resorting to a Goods and Services Tax. Our travel and tourism sector are struggling and need urgent reform in order to thrive again. The States must practise good housekeeping: cut waste, manage budgets responsibly, and be fully accountable to the public. I will fight for greater transparency and full disclosure, because secrecy breeds distrust and the people of Guernsey deserve better.

My Closing Message

No more excuses, but real action. I am ready to stand up for you, to work hard, and to fight for a fairer, more compassionate future. Together, we can rebuild trust in our government, protect those who need it most, and ensure no one is left behind. If elected, I will give my all to represent our community with integrity, determination, and heart for you, for our Island and for a better tomorrow.

Joining the senior committee, The Policy and Resources Committee was an important milestone for me as I put my experience to good use reviewing and making decisions on many diverse areas from taxation to information technology. The regular updates from Europe and the French regions of Normandy and Brittany particularly interest me and I would like to do more external affairs work. backed by evidence of what will work for Guernsey. , we have become too risk averse over the past few years to the detriment of the island. The coronavirus crisis produced, strong effective leadership and good outcomes, compared with many other jurisdictions. But I would love a huge renewed personal mandate to make a positive difference for you. Having previously sat on many committees, I am willing to lead or sit on any one of the Committees. bringing continuity of experience and difference to the discussions and decision making .

MY PLEDGE TO MODERNISE SOCIETY - We need to keep our international obligations and promises by prioritising resources to sign up to the global treaties we have already committed to such as those that outlaw all forms of discrimination, we need to bring the business community with us to find pragmatic workable solutions, building on the positive heritage of previous Presidents of ESS, Michelle Le Clerc, and Peter Roffey.

MY MANDATE TO STRENGTHEN CARE OPTIONS - I believe that any attempt to oblige people to sell their homes to finance excessive care costs is unacceptable to myself and the majority of islanders. However, the SLAWS (Supported Living and Ageing Well) package, recently approved in the States is not the complete answer and the solution is very complex.

I did not vote for the new £10,000 mandatory contribution to care or the huge personal care uplifts, by the time of the next election in 2029 patients or residents in homes will be forced to pay a co-payment of nearly £26,000 per year! My policy would be to negotiate more States Rate care beds and to encourage the development of more private and or states owned care facilities. I support an equity release scheme as a tool to assist with current private top-up fees, as well as helping people pay for adaptations to enable them to stay in their own homes longer.

I would support the possibility of developing further extra care facilities such as those that we already have at Nouvelle Maritaine and Le Grande Courtil. If the Labour Government under Sir Keir Starmer succeeds at reducing immigration this will affect Guernsey and our care system, we will have little choice, as we are part of the Common Travel Area. We need to develop and upskill our local workforce to attract people into caring, we know will have to pay more. It is not until we need care, or our loved ones need care that we realise the invaluable service that carers provide and the complex nature of funding Long Term Care.

A MANDATE TO MONITOR AND REDUCE THE COST OF LIVING - We need our thinking hats on here and there is nothing too cuddly about fiscal policies. We need to help those who struggle with costly household expenditure with more targeted support and less taxation, for those on lower incomes. Many islanders are worse off as lower middle earners than other jurisdictions We don't do enough to help people just about managing.

I support raising personal allowances introducing lower 15% rates of tax for earnings below say £35,000, higher benefits limitations and in work incentives such as earnings disregards. I support a fair taxation policy for all of Guernsey. This can be paid for by restraining higher paid public sector posts, more emphasis on consumption taxes and economic growth. We need a relaxation of population controls for skilled younger professionals in many industries.

We need a clear economic recovery plan which wisely invests in infrastructure, small business and digital growth if we can expand and enhance our air, sea transport links with Jersey, the UK and Europe this could act as an economic enabler.

MY IDEAS ON TOWN AND PLANNING - St Peter Port Town Centre is the jewel in our crown. 1000's of visitors pass through the town in the summer months, our centre needs to continue to thrive to attract business and visitors alike. We have underinvested in our town centre our ports and harbours for too many years, and I support closer working between Government via the Guernsey Development Agency and the St Peter Port and St Sampsons Douzaine.

As an England and Wales Green Party member and delegate, I obviously support strengthening biodiversity but balanced with economic considerations. I would ban noisy motorbikes and consider increasing minimum age for riding motorbikes from 14 to 16.

We need clarity on planning policy and practice. Experience tells me we have to choose between a politically directed model and an entire professional process structure. The current mish mash of increasingly infrequently held open planning meetings, delayed decisions and tribunals trumping political decisions needs a complete review. I will promote more exemptions, loans and grants for energy conservation and preserving historic buildings. We need to ensure we continue to provide green lungs for wildlife habitats and for social wellbeing as well as providing green field conservation protection.

A MANDATE TO REFORM GOVERNMENT - I believe in the long term, Guernsey would have a clearer, more accountable and open system of Government with Ministerial positions and collective policy co-ordination in a more Cabinet executive-type structure, improving decision making and accountability.

The role of a Deputy needs re-evaluation as the current position lacks clear duties, research and secretarial support.,

WHAT DO I BRING TO THE STATES AND ISLAND GOVERNMENT AND SOCIETY?

I AM A COMMUNITY POLITICIAN - I am well known for attending and participating in many events and aspects of island life from heritage to environmental pursuits, historic architectural visits, fayres arts, walks and sports. I believe that I am one of the most accessible Deputies, this enables me to listen and learn about the issues that ordinary people care about and raise them as questions in the monthly States Meetings.

I support the amazing talent in our community and would like to introduce to Guernsey an Arts & Culture funding scheme similar to the Jersey scheme which provides a one percent grant to Arts and Culture. Arts and Culture are a key part of our economic development, as well as providing, many full time and part time careers as well as being good for social wellbeing. We need to ensure Beau Sejour is retained and enhanced for the community, it provides a vital service and resource to almost every family on the island. I am in support of continuing to support Beau Sejour as a Community provision even if it needs subsidy from Government.

I was pleased to join the St Peter Port douzaine last year in a by-election sadly caused by the premature death of my close friend and colleague Mike Garrett. It has been an interesting extra dimension as I chair the Policy and Resources Douzaine parish liaison group. From assisting with planning reviews to supporting festive lights and enhancing the Town and its links with France and keeping parks and the Town Church in good order are vital to our sense of belonging.

I support many charities. I am President of Living Streets, trying to improve pedestrians' safety and the green lane environment. I am on the Committee of Friends of the Priaulx Library and support the Rehabilitation of ex-offenders' group, mental health drop ins and community cafes. I support third sector financing, commissioning grants and appropriate partnership with tax reductions from Gift Aid and would support the exemption of GST on Charities if GST was introduced. The Voluntary sector is a vital resource to the island we need to ensure a firmer more robust relationship with the voluntary sector, as well as the



- 4. Building our affordable housing stock;
- 5. Addressing the barriers to Education; and
- 6. Ensuring equal access to Employment for all.



I am committed to seeing Guernsey thrive and building a true community.

What do I stand for in a nutshell?

The long-term fiscal and social sustainability and stability of the island.

Core Values:

In our current system, each deputy has one vote. We all have ideas and opinions, we all want to try and change the tanker around in the best way we think. There will be many issues not mentioned in this manifesto, and multiple solutions. For these, I will vote and act according to my core values:

 Integrity and accountability: To vote for what I truly believe is right for Guernsey regardless of a vocal minority. To act transparently, uphold ethical standards and work to ensure government is accountable at all levels.

- **Sustainability**: Act in a way that ensures future generations are always in mind- this includes immigration, energy, tax and our economy.
- **Fairness**: Act in a way that is fair, reasonable, logical and proportionate.
- Opportunity: We face many challenges, I will always seek for the opportunities that lie ahead, especially those that can help people achieve their potential.

- Collaboration: Too much is polarised, and too little is about listening. I'll seek common ground where possible

 and when a clear choice is needed,

Future plans, vision & policies

I support looking towards Guernseys long term future and considering the bigger picture. There are many things to try and solve in the next term. As I say, one of the things I stand for is fixing the root cause of the problem, not just the symptom. If you are driving a car on a road of nails you don't just change the tyre when you get a puncture- you clear the nails.

Balanced Accounts:

A priority must be balancing the books. Inaction will result in our reserves being depleted in seven years. We don't have the luxury of procrastinating and trying to find the ever elusive silver bullet. We should keep in mind that increases in tax have a wider impact on the economy and disposable income.

• Tax: Without a viable alternative that is as progressive as the GST+ package, then we should implement the package already voted in by the assembly as soon as we can. It makes 60% of households better off. The later we leave it the harder and costlier it will be.



- Savings: We should be seeking to cut waste and make savings. I have been serious about savings and have voted for them many times.
- Reform: Some of the biggest savings come from government wide changes such as: removing non essential overtime, removing the use of travel agencies and non-local recruitment agencies, introducing internal captive insurance schemes, and 'new-to-the island' compulsory health insurance.

Economy & AI:

The world is getting tougher, and our finance sector remains vital. We must support it wherever we can—while also diversifying. Here are key steps I believe we should take to strengthen and future-proof our economy:

 Travel: We need a reliable and affordable airline (and ferry). This should be a priority. Our life line links are exactly that, but also economic enablers or disablers.

- **Travel**: Regular, reliable and cheap travel to Jersey could help with the affordability, whilst maintaining route options. It would help both islands, as often a limiting factor for us is scale.
- Diversification: Entrepreneurs, new ventures and opportunities should be supported, they can mitigate against shocks from any sector, one way would be offering tax incentives/support during the set-up period.
- Skills + Education: Artificial intelligence is transforming the economy. We should facilitate its integration in our schools and create affordable, on-island training through partnerships with businesses, incentivised by tax deductions. Upskilling our workforce is key to driving innovation, boosting productivity, and securing long-term economic growth.

Birth Rate & Demographics

We have a declining birth rate, and a changing demographic. When looking at the long term sustainability for our island, we need to address this. Here are some of the things I believe will help our local and young people to stay on island whilst making sure we can cope with changing demands:

• Early years strategy: There is a need for an early years strategy, and a family services review in conjunction with the primary review that seeks to address ways to help current and future parents. It could include wrap around care, a change to the system for pre-school hours, perhaps offering cash alternatives.



- Housing: a 'must address' issue. There is not enough affordable housing on the island. Building more houses often means losing green space; we should facilitate and prioritise development off brownfield sites to be re-developed. I led an amendment to have the first £10k tax free from having lodgers to help with the cost of living crisis whilst increasing rooms on island.
- Healthcare Model: currently our health costs are rising more and more each year, without a sensible, affordable plan going forward this is unsustainable. I will support the review into primary care, and work towards the universal offer that all islanders can all expect.



Government & Procedure:

Our consensus system has its challenges—too often, key issues are revisited and delayed. Those delays aren't just frustrating; they've cost us millions. We need a more decisive, accountable approach.

I support reviewing and streamlining our machinery of government. I'll also push to reform procedures so decisions are based on evidence and impartial financial analysis—not politics.

- I'll push to reform rules so the financial impact of amendments and proposals is clear before any vote. Deputies should make decisions based on full, transparent information.
- Recent changes to spending rules don't go far enough to meet public expectations. I'll push for clearer, stronger rules to ensure fairness, transparency, and trust in our elections.
- Speech limits are now part of our proceedings, but their use remains at the discretion of the presiding officer. On major issues, every side deserves a full and fair hearing. To strengthen democracy and decision-making, this rule must be clarified and applied consistently, not selectively.
- Currently, deputies are often left to scrutinise their own work. That's not good enough. Independent scrutiny would make decision-making more transparent, strengthen public trust, and help us dig deeper into

the issues that matter. It could also lead to significant savings for taxpayers by catching problems earlier.

Being Better:

I have worked hard this last term, and promise to continue to do my best for you all should I be elected. Self reflection is a powerful tool- I have learned many things, here are some things that i would do differently:

- Be more active in our third sector and charities through voluntary work.
- Offer an alternative outlet to traditional media by way of a YouTube channel, and increasing social media presence.
- Work closer with colleagues, from 'across the isle', especially when forming amendments.

There is no doubt that Guernsey is still a beautiful place to live and Guernsey people amongst the most resourceful, but we face real and significant headwinds, both local and external.

Housing

If elected, my first priority will be housing, where the crippling costs are beyond most people's aspirations. This is driving away our young people, creating wage inflation and significantly reducing disposable incomes, contributing to a spiral in high costs of living and growing homelessness.

My preferred approach is a practical one -government and political strategies and documents don't build houses, builders and developers do.

I will call for the new housing authority to organize a public conference to bring together the third sector, builders, developers, the public and lenders with the aim of generating real, tangible action points for government and to make their implementation a central priority.

More and ever larger government which we can't afford, and more documents, policies, objectives and rules is not the answer, we must start responding to the real problems.

Government is aggravating the problem by housing too many temporary staff in local, rental property and this has caused supply to drop and rents to rise. If elected, I will seek to re-submit the application to build the much needed 120 units of staff accommodation at the hospital, to

provide permanent relief for the private sector. This would be funded through borrowing rather than using our reserves and the rental income used to repay it.

We simply can't afford to be sentimental over small pieces of low-grade agricultural land, historically bought by the States specifically for hospital development, whilst islanders are sleeping rough.

It is also my view that the stalled plans for Leale's Yard need to be urgently resurrected to provide the planned 300+ units before momentum is lost yet again. If necessary that should involve compulsory purchase of the property to unlock the development.

The Civil Service/Public Sector

I sense real frustration at some of the decisions being made with insufficient regard for the effects on islanders' heritage, culture and way of life, including the indirect costs of having to comply with new rules and regulations.

When you elect a Deputy, you rightly expect them to have the authority to get things done and to be accountable for it, but far too much is currently being done without political oversight and the size and cost of government continues to grow as a result.

I believe we need to reset the relationship between politicians and the public sector to ensure that delegated authority cannot be used to do anything "novel, contentious or repercussive" without political input.

I want to see deeper reform of government and public sector relationships so that you can hold your politicians properly accountable for decision making.



Government Efficiency

The assembly is a source of vast wasted time and cost. Routine business could be done in a more efficient way, providing more time for informed debate on key issues. Selective rule changes could bring much needed discipline to the operations of government and the assembly.

I believe we should have a system where we have a committee of ministers, elected by their peers, capable of centrally controlling spending and policy plans. In my view this is the only realistic way to effect the savings and other changes we so desperately need.

I have been consistent in calling for cuts and savings throughout this term, the assembly currently lacks the powers and the cross-committee willpower to prioritise and enforce them.

Finances, Tax & Zero 10

Government is currently living on borrowed time and living off our savings. Whilst nobody wants to pay more tax we must face up to this reality.

The fairest means of raising revenue, without creating even more economic stress and risk, is through the now approved, progressive GST+ tax proposals. Under these, 60% of local households will pay less tax overall, even after GST, than they do today. This is because there will be a lower income tax rate on the first 30k of earnings, an allowance for social security and special protection for pensioners. You can find more details of this at www.markhelyar.gg. I am not in favour of GST without these additional elements and, as treasury

lead, I would not have supported the proposals without these significant, progressive mitigations. We now may be able to do even more by using the proceeds from the Pillar II corporate taxes which I introduced when leading treasury.

I have personally invested hundreds of hours working on this issue, together with some of the world's foremost tax experts, to try and avoid these steps, but the fact is that Guernsey remains a global outlier in collecting almost the lowest amount of GDP in the developed world and having no form of consumption taxation. We are rapidly running out of money.

Just 6% of residents pay 25% of all income tax collected and finance is directly responsible for 40% (indirectly for more). This group is already paying the majority of the Island's bills and we also simply cannot afford to risk chasing that revenue away.

We must broaden our tax base, enabling us to start rebuilding our crumbling infrastructure and generate some positive economic momentum for our Island. Every day we put this off we put our Island at further risk

Over the years I have suggested that we should look to raise all corporate taxation rates, currently subject to zero-10, up to 15% and once the tax package is implemented we should pursue that further.

The Economy

We currently have no coherent plan for enabling economic growth. This is vital for providing diversity of employment, retaining our young people and growing a sustainable economy for the future.

If elected, I will call for an early kickstart - bringing all economic sectors and their governing bodies, the third sector, regulators and government across the whole Bailiwick together to debate regulation, innovation, connectivity, risk and our collective future. We currently have no unified growth plan and need it to come from our industries, not from government - policy generated by Islanders for the Islands.

If elected, I will stand for election as President of Policy & Resources, having been the Vice President and Treasury Lead for 3 years, but regardless of the outcome, I promise to continue to contribute to the best of my ability on your behalf.

It is not it is the building of houses for States tenants. Nothing wrong with that, but that means that first-time buyers are still left without affordable housing. Both need to be addressed, and if that means working long hours looking at solutions, so be it.

TAX OR GST?

The wrong question was put to the people; it should have been Tax, GST or savings. I believe the choice would be saving millions by the better management of the Island's estate. It is not only a savings in human resources, but is also looking at what is owned and the intelligent use of resources.

The Island went through a significant assessment and achieved a highly successful outcome, comparing positively to other jurisdictions. The myriad of officers within the civil service who worked tirelessly to make this a success need commending as does the finance sector that came under significant scrutiny. I'd shudder to think what a 'grey listing' might have meant for Guernsey; but that didn't happen.

Delivery: Brexit and Fisheries

Negotiating access to Guernsey waters while protecting our own historic fishing industry was one of the first challenge as Brexitunfolded. We did this at pace, negotiating with a wider number of parties and jurisdictions with different objectives. We stuck to our guns and got a good result!

Keyworkers - Policy Position

What the pandemic taught me, was that there is "no such thing as unskilled labour" - something I have often repeated in the States. All employees are cogs in the wheels of any machine. Lose the specialised cleaning staff in any hospital and your highly paid surgeon's theatre closes; lose the kitchen porter from any restaurant and your glad-handing Maître D' is not serving food that night. "The great lesson for me is that we are all keyworkers in our economy".

Housing - Policy Position

Imported staff are important for public service delivery. But **Guernsey's sons** and daughters should get a bias in favour for any new housing. Imported workers should not get a guaranteed priority for new houses built with your money. That policy is unfair, unreasonable, and not good enough. It turns Guernsey into a glorified carousel.

Public and Civil Servants – Policy Position

Some harsh words have been said about our civil servants and front-line staff; much of it from Deputies in the Assembly or political commentators looking for an easy ball to kick. That is not my position, and I respect the time that most of them put into their work. However, there must be inefficiencies within an organisation. I would support an efficiency drive.

Economic Growth – St Sampson's Harbour

The key to future economic growth is on the eastern seaboard particularly at St Sampson's. I sat as part of the Political Oversight Group for the Guernsey Development Agency and support their key objectives. The development of moderately affordable homes at Griffiths Yard is very encouraging. And I would pursue those priorities if elected.

Economic Growth – Leale's Yard

The 300+ homes that would have been a game changer for St Sampson's has failed to materialise. The economic benefits from that obvious to most, but the maths didn't work for government. This project needs one final shot with a fresh new team to establish whether it will go forward. As an optimist, I'd like to think there's a way; but if a fair deal for the developer and the taxpayer can't be done, I would shelve the project and invest government money elsewhere.

Where to serve if elected

I would like to use my four years to assist in infrastructure development and housing. STSB is key to unlocking infrastructure development across so many areas and would consider putting myself forward as President of STSB. Another role I would consider is on Policy and Resources, requesting the remit for the Property Portfolio; that is another area of government that could unlock economic potential

In reality little is achieved and often the statements made are designed to lure voters into believing that the person will carry out what they are promising, the reality is often very different.

We all know what needs to be done in general terms and that is where I hope we can go. At the end of each term there is normally a consensus that the incumbent States is the worst that there has ever been and nothing has been achieved and plenty has been wasted, both in time and financially.

As individuals little can be achieved, but collectively, we should be able to achieve plenty. We need to do less talking and more action. Policy should be based on effective and meaningful objectives which promote efficiency and accountability. Government owned and controlled organisations need to be dynamic but also effective; if they are to be economic enablers, they need to be transparent but also truly offer economic development, they can't just be supported at any cost.

We need to stop offering subsidies to organisations that are inefficient due to their having no accountability for losses. Government operated businesses should be our ambassadors, they should be shining examples of what we can do. Just imagine if you arrived in Guernsey and as you walk into the airport you are greeted with a 'Good Morning and Welcome to Guernsey'.

Housing

Apparently, we need more. Is that the case or is it just too expensive? Rentals are also deemed expensive and often of poor quality.

We need to first establish what is really needed and then try and achieve it. Joint projects with the private sector for developments. Encourage investments into rentals: 20% tax on rental income should be allowed to be offset against expenditure on properties, this would encourage landlords to invest.

New builds: work with the private sector, allow tax breaks for such developments and encourage self builds for individuals. This could be achieved by creating building sites and other support. The GHA needs to be building homes.

Connectivity

It is the worst it has ever been and we all know that, whether it be by sea or air. Routes between the islands are irregular, unreliable and expensive. This needs to change. We need strong inter-island connectivity between all the islands and especially Jersey as well as the UK. We presently offer subsidies to at least three ferry companies, a bus operator and one airline and in theory they all compete. This is not joined up thinking. We need a clear strategy, let's aim to get regular services between the islands and make it affordable, let's make it a pleasant experience so the customer wants to travel rather than does so out of necessity.

Spending

This goes hand in hand with the tax debate. If we spend less, then we need to generate less. Unfortunately spending seems to generally increase but are we getting value for money? Are the spenders accountable? Does the island get what it deserves? Are we paying too many people and not getting enough back? Tenders should be better monitored and less prescriptive; if we are asking for a specialist job to be performed then don't tell them how to do it, ask for the best and most cost effective - make it truly competitive.

Tax

We need it to pay for stuff, but before we look to increase it for everyone why don't we look at where we are spending it? If we look at efficiency, which doesn't just mean cost cutting, we might not need more money. Vanity projects need to stop, if we have large surpluses then we can look at projects that involve building huge new harbours and moving the power station, but not in the present economic environment. We need to focus on getting the present right and then start planning ahead.


Cost efficiency should be driven by accountability. Consultants should be used when necessary but not as a matter of course. States employees at all levels should be accountable for their relative responsibilities; managers should manage and bring value to the organisation for which they work. Objectives should be set, implemented, and measured.

If increased revenue for the island is truly needed, we should look at alternative sources as well as tax. Possible joint ventures with the private sector should be encouraged, but the main initial cost should be borne by the private sector. A ships registry could be an example, for commercial shipping an offshore wind/tidal farm could be another?

Manifesto priorities

A strong, fair economy means everyone can contribute—through meaningful work, family life, and active participation in our community—while enjoying a good quality of life.

The Priorities opposite reflect where our key challenges and opportunities lie and align with voices of our business bodies, charity and community.

But none of this is possible without fair tax reform and rebuilding trust that public services are run efficiently and deliver real value.

Sustainable Public Finances

We're no longer balancing the books—Zero-10, low economic growth and an ageing population have left us unable to fund housing, schools, and hospitals without exhausting our savings in a few years.

Closing the deficit through cuts alone leads to unpalatable choices—like defunding Colleges, slashing the Sports Commission grant, or charging cancer patients in A&E—all of which proved deeply unpopular and were reversed or rejected. Even standing still costs more, as inflation, regulation and demographic pressures keep driving up the cost of public services.

The burden of taxation has concentrated even further on the working population. The cost of living is especially hard for young people who cannot afford the housing or the childcare and are making the hard decision to move away or even not to have children.

There's growing recognition that we need to raise more revenue—but what's still missing is a tax reform that carries broad public support.

Tax reform must:

- Increase contributions from the corporate sector
- Shift reliance away from taxing employment
- Protect low- and middle-income households
- Review tax caps and investment company taxation
- Include childcare support through allowances or grants
- Ensure timely and efficient tax collection

Efficient delivery of public services

While raising revenue is essential, delivering public services efficiently must be a top priority. There are still serious concerns about rising costs and whether services are being run as effectively as they should be.

There's a lack of trust that proposed tax increases will be enough—and real questions about which services government should be providing.

These are vital issues with no quick fix. Addressing them will require sustained effort from deputies, the civil service, and the wider community.

We must review which services should be publicly funded—this will be central to the upcoming Fundamental Services Review.

Clearer lines of responsibility and stronger accountability are essential; too often, these have become blurred in our current system of government.

We need to strengthen partnerships with industry—through public-private collaborations, commissioning, and by drawing more effectively on the expertise and funding available on-island.

Innovation, digital tools, and AI can help us deliver services more efficiently and adapt to future needs.

Above all, we must rebuild trust. That means resetting the culture, improving communication, and involving both the public and industry more closely in policy development and delivery.





HOUSING: THE HEART OF THE PROBLEM

Housing is now the most visible symbol of inequality in Guernsey. It touches every part of island life:

- Young islanders are leaving because they can't afford to stay; we struggle to attract off-island talent
- Wage pressures rise as workers seek higher pay just to cover housing, damaging competitiveness
- Millions are spent subsidising critical worker accommodation, diverting funds from services
- Local businesses suffer as disposable income falls
- Poor conditions strain Health and Social Services
- Families are separated, weakening community roots

The States have strategic ambitions for nearly 1000 new homes across sites like Black Rock. But, even if started, they may take two decades to deliver, while imposing heavily on the north of the island.

From the 1970s-1990s, many islanders built their own homes. The appetite hasn't changed, but costs have moved self-builds out of reach for most. As larger strategies develop, we need short-term, tactical solutions. One option is to allow special sustainable self-builds using modern, low-impact technology on land currently off-limits to traditional housing, e.g., plots on the edge of domestic curtilage.

These energy-efficient, owner-occupied modular homes would utilise modern technology foundations instead of concrete, reducing environmental impact, speeding up delivery and dramatically cutting costs. They could open up land that wouldn't otherwise qualify, creating capacity without sprawl.

To ensure affordability, plot prices must reflect the restricted use and sustainable status of the builds. This could be done through planning conditions or land-use rules that restrict resale, prevent speculative investment, and lock in the self-build purpose. Previously unviable land could be reclassified for low-impact housing only, unlocking supply while suppressing price inflation.

Crucially, these homes could be removed if no longer needed, with land restored to nature - unlike concrete developments. There's no deep excavation, no permanent scars, just the potential to rewild, reuse, or reimagine.

This isn't about lowering standards; it's about raising ambitions. These homes offer affordability, security, and sustainability while increasing capacity and giving people the freedom to solve their own housing needs.

THE STATES MUST SUPPORT LOCAL

BUSINESSES Our government must use its spending power to support the local economy. Every pound spent locally multiplies through jobs and businesses. I want to radically overhaul the procurement process to favour local firms and keep our economy strong.

PUBLIC APPRECIATION OF FINANCIAL SERVICES MUST BE FOSTERED The financial

services industry has been a cornerstone of Guernsey's prosperity for decades, but there are many local people who can't see its value. The industry has faced many challenges in recent years – decline in local ownership, global regulatory changes, erosion of skills and leadership, and innovation led from non-Guernsey jurisdictions.

Historically, we have benefited from some fantastic local finance startups, but the barriers to entry are now so high that it is unrealistic to expect this to repeat without facilitation. I have a raft of new ideas that will breathe new life into the industry and foster local innovation and leadership, and rebuild pride in this critical sector.

QUALITY AT THE TOP No matter how good our chosen politicians, they will be set up to fail unless we have the requisite skills at the top of the Civil Service. We now have a new CEO in Boley Smilie, and I want to ensure that he can have the best management team based on merit, not time served.

BRING STATES IT SUPPORT BACK TO
GUERNSEY I believe the current arrangement has

failed operationally, technically, strategically and financially. Having owned and run large technology companies, as well as seen the States IT procurement process first hand, I am determined to get this contract back on island. Doing so will be a boost to the local economy, reduce costs and improve reliability.





A DEEPER DIVE: SMALL ECONOMIES FUNCTION DIFFERENTLY

Our government can't print money or change interest rates, but it does have a powerful, underused tool: every pound spent in Guernsey can generate up to four pounds in local economic value.

Each year the States spend millions of pounds on off-island products and services, even when the skills and products are available locally. The IT contract and new school builds are just two examples. Many local businesses find the current procurement system unnecessarily complex and prohibitive, leaving them unable or unwilling to bid for business.

If elected, my mission will be to radically change government procurement and to use it as an economic lever where the impact on the economy is fully weighed on procurement decisions.

PUBLIC FINANCES Fiscal responsibility and transparency in public spending needs more scrutiny. The electorate is rightly concerned about how government funds are allocated, especially in light of significant investments in education and healthcare infrastructure. My policies focus on wealth generation and a fairer society; we can only avoid GST if we can boost the economy without leaving people behind.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND SUSTAINABILITY

I founded and ran the international climate change company FutureTracker before selling the business in early 2025. I am passionate about sustainability but pragmatic. Until the States acts sustainably in its own operations and sets an affordable example to business, it's hard to believe the rhetoric.

CONNECTIVITY Over the years the States has subsidised multiple routes to encourage people from places like Paris and Amsterdam to Guernsey. Usually, they end up unsustainable after the subsidy ends and are dropped. I support the work going on at the moment to reintroduce a Heathrow route; this will be great for locals, visitors and businesses. I have seen Guernsey lose business too often due to our unreliable link with Gatwick.

AURIGNY We are expecting spectacular losses to be announced at Aurigny at the time of writing this manifesto. While I accept that breaking even is a tough proposition when operating our lifeline services, we have to get a grip on these losses. I look forward to getting an insight into how we have sustained such losses and how we can avoid a repeat.

RECOGNISING LOCAL EXCELLENCE

Too often, we assume that innovation and expertise must come from elsewhere - larger cities or international firms - overlooking the remarkable talent in our own backyard. In Guernsey, this mindset has long held back local businesses, which often have to work twice as hard for the same recognition given more freely to outsiders. It's time to challenge that narrative.

As former MD of successful Guernsey companies, I've seen first-hand the world-class capability we have right here. Guernsey is home to innovative, dynamic companies in finance, tech, sustainability, and creative industries - businesses that aren't just keeping up, but leading on the global stage.

The future of our island's success doesn't lie in looking outward, but in acknowledging and investing in what we already have.

Stronger protection for our coastline and clearer fly-tipping enforcement

Safe, Sustainable Transport



Manifesto

Introduction

I want the States to focus on doing fewer things—but do them well and quickly. Below are some proposals to start fixing the States, including specific promises. After reading this, I hope you will give me your vote.

Housing, Homelessness & Cost of Housing

Our housing situation is dire. Affordable housing has been outsourced to the GHA. They are doing a good job but can't keep up with demand. We need to take back control and act fast. We cannot wait for developers who, understandably, build for maximum profit. What we need now are affordable homes—not in years, but today.

Progress has been minimal. In four years, we've barely moved forward. Yes, we agreed to form a Housing Committee, but in my view, that was just another example of kicking the can down the road. Actions, not words.

The States already own land and have access to part of the unspent £330 million loan. We've recently approved changes to the Island Development Plan, allowing for 'Strategically Essential Development.' Surely housing qualifies?

With land, capital, and flexibility, we should be building modular housing now—small one and two-bedroom homes for rent, purchase, or rent-to-buy. Exclude speculators and buy-to-let landlords. Bring in specialist modular

housing teams to build them if needed. In the short term, we should allow the charity-run sleeping pods on States land.

Promise: If elected, I will with others, push for this plan immediately.

Cost of Living

The rising cost of living affects everyone. While not all factors are within our control, many States policies have made things worse.

We create too many regulations, requiring more civil servants and charging more fees. A key example is the energy strategy. Regardless of your views on climate change, our priority must be affordable, reliable electricity via cable, on-island generation, wind, or solar—whichever is cheapest.

Recently, I successfully persuaded the States to stop ratepayers from funding rectories—a small but meaningful win. Over the years, it will save ratepayers hundreds of thousands of pounds, helping the struggling residents.

Promise: If elected, I will pursue a cost-reduction strategy across all committees. No compromise.

Taxation

I have consistently opposed the introduction of GST. It would harm pensioners, especially those on fixed incomes, and women who paid reduced-rate stamps and now do not have a full pension. This is a stain on the States of Guernsey.

Promise: I will attempt to persuade other members to resolve this issue for these women.

The GST rate itself is still undecided: 5%, 8%, or higher? Food exempt? School fees exempt? We just don't know. GST is not inevitable.

Instead, we should first:

- Shift some of the tax burden from individuals to corporations who are benefiting from the 0/10 model.
- Review and improve the tax collection processes.
- Increase or remove tax caps on ultra-high-net-worth individuals while helping middle earners.
- Apply changes to Social Security caps for high earners.
- Introduce a temporary 'Infrastructure Levy' of 2% with a five-year sunset clause to preserve our headline 20% income tax rate while carrying out changes some of which are listed above.

There are other things we can do to painlessly increase the tax take. We must stop States owned entities working against local retailers who are struggling to compete. For example, Guernsey Post promoting off island shopping.

Pillar 2, a global tax standard for large companies may bring in up to £30 million annually, but is very uncertain.

Promise: I will remain anti-GST and insist all alternatives are pursued before GST is brought back to the States.

Accountability and the Civil Service

Civil servants and consultants must be held accountable when they provide misleading or incomplete information. Reforms are needed:

- Introduce performance-related pay to the workforce.
- Efficiency review and reduce unnecessary management while boosting front line workers.
- Review the States pension scheme for all States employees.
- Restore proper political oversight of delegated powers.

Promise: If elected, I will clearly and firmly communicate expectations to committee civil servants and advisors.

Health

Health costs are rising. PEH Phase 2 went significantly over budget, in part due to information being withheld by civil servants. This must not be allowed to happen again. Financial oversight by politicians has been seriously lacking.

Guernsey cannot match UK healthcare services without UK-level taxes. We are a sub scale jurisdiction, everything costs more. We should send more complex cases off-island when necessary. Those with private health insurance should be encouraged to use it, easing pressure on public resources.

Transport

Electric vehicles should not be tax-exempt. They use public roads and cause wear and tear and add to congestion as any other car does. A fair system of EV taxation could begin as early as 2026.

Aurigny continues to deliver poor service with delays, cancellations, and aircraft issues. The so-called Black Swan events of 2024 just continue unabated. Frankly, something has to change.

Promise: If elected, I will demand a full review of Aurigny. It is the States responsibility to have effective management installed, it is operating to maximum efficiency and in the best interests of Guernsey.

The ferry deal with Brittany Ferries included Guernsey purchasing the Islander vessel earlier under Emergency powers given to the Civil Contingencies Authority. No information on this has been released but the public have a right to know how their money is spent. I will work to change Civil Contingencies Authority rules.

Education

Education spending has increased dramatically, particularly for the Sixth Form Centre and Guernsey Institute. These must be properly scrutinized and if there is fault by anyone it must be dealt with accordingly.

Some form of selection should return. It's a part of life, and pretending it doesn't exist is unrealistic.

Schools need to be freed from the dead hand of central control by giving schools more autonomy.

Promise: I will demand the ESC Committee pursues academic excellence at reasonable cost as it's number one priority.

Climate Policy

Climate goals must be practical and affordable. Most accept global warming is real, but Guernsey's impact is negligible. We cannot bankrupt ourselves while congratulating ourselves how good we are at carbon reduction.

States Governance and Public Finances

Too many projects are approved with flawed, incomplete or simply wrong information. Examples:

- The hospital extension
- The Sixth Form Centre
- The Alderney runway

Transparency and scrutiny are essential to prevent cost escalations post-approval. The States needs to become more open and transparent with the public.

Promise: I will demand proper evidence and challenge weak or missing information.

Discrimination

I stand for no discrimination against anyone, full stop!

Work in the current Term

I have already mentioned my success in persuading the Assembly to agree to stop long suffering rate payers having to pay for the upkeep of the parish rectory. This was a landmark decision as the practice was hundreds of years old.

Also, to repeat I have voted against every attempt to introduce GST. A very pernicious tax that will hit pensioners and lowly paid workers most. The mitigants were woefully inadequate.

I voted in favour of Deputies having to declare all assets held outside of Guernsey.

I voted against any proposal that required more Civil Servants.

I voted for the Age Discrimination legislation.

And many more!

A decade of missed opportunities, time for action

For over ten years, Guernsey has failed to build enough homes to meet the needs of its people. Since I first stood for election in 2016, housing has remained one of my top priorities.

Back then, I warned that our target of 300 new homes per year was unrealistic. In 2015, we saw a net increase of just 144 homes - only a small portion of which were affordable units. By 2020, the situation had worsened. Policy GP11, which aimed to secure social housing from large developments, delivered no units at all. Instead, it discouraged any meaningful development altogether.

This failure was compounded by the 2016 restructuring, which removed housing from the title - and focus - of the relevant Committee; Employment, Housing & Social Security became Employment & Social Security. While other priorities took centre stage, meaningful action on housing fell by the wayside during that term.

The introduction of the Island Development Plan (IDP) and the Population Management Law (PML) in 2016 and 2017 respectively, created a perfect storm in the Local Market. Policy GP11 in the IDP made large sites financially unviable, and new PML rules allowed incoming workers to compete with locals for the same

limited housing stock. Development stalled, prices soared, and those most in need were left behind.

I fought to repeal GP11 during the last term but received very little support, but it wasn't until 2023 - after a successful Requête signed by myself and 6 other members - that we finally removed this damaging policy. We are now starting to see progress, with previously stalled sites because of GP11, now moving forward.

Crucially, we've also reinstated a standalone Housing Committee, via another successful Requête brought by myself and 6 other members. With dedicated focus and accountability, we can now begin to tackle this crisis properly.

If re-elected, I will continue to prioritise housing. We must deliver affordable homes, unlock stalled developments, and ensure our planning and population policies support - not hinder - housing delivery.

Committed to community, focused on progress

TAXATION

A fairer, smarter approach

This term saw three major tax debates, including proposals for a Goods & Services Tax (GST) and income tax rises. I have firmly opposed GST, which would unfairly burden islanders during a cost-of-living crisis, especially when wealthy individuals and corporations continue to exploit gaps in our tax system.

My preference is to reform corporate taxation and now is the time. The OECD's upcoming Pillar 2 rules will require a 15% minimum tax on large multinationals - expected to raise up to £40 million annually. In addition, we must close longstanding loopholes that allow many individuals to avoid paying tax, through personal investment companies. Jersey closed these gaps over 15 years ago; it's time we did the same.

A Territorial Corporation Tax can also help address the structural £100 million deficit created by Zero-10, whilst at the same time not affecting the large employers in finance, as their profits are not derived from within Guernsey. While I'm not ruling out GST forever, it must be the last resort - not the first. We should fix our tax system at the top before placing more pressure on working people.

AGING DEMOGRAPHIC

Caring for our ageing population

Guernsey's ageing population presents one of our biggest social and financial challenges. We must ensure that people can access quality long-term care without the fear of losing their homes to pay for it. The current system is outdated and unsustainable.

The SLAWS (Supported Living and Ageing Well Strategy) work stream offers a pathway to reform, but it must be properly funded and prioritised. I support developing a sustainable model that shares costs fairly, protects family homes, and ensures dignity in later life.

We must act now to future-proof care provision and give people the security they deserve as they age.

HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE

Leadership, experience, and ongoing reform

I've served on the Health & Social Care Committee throughout this term and have spent the past year as Vice-President. This role has given me a broader, hands-on understanding of the scale and complexity of HSC's responsibilities - from hospital services to community care.

During this term, I've been proud to help deliver key improvements, including the opening of the new de Havilland Orthopaedic Ward, which has helped reduce waiting times. I've also led the development and launch of the Mental Health & Wellbeing Strategy 2023–2029, chairing the cross-committee technical team that's driving real, collaborative change across health, education, employment, justice and the wider community.



Our health and care system is undergoing major transformation - modernising both the facilities and the way services are funded and delivered. This work spans electoral terms and requires consistent leadership, cross-Committee cooperation, and strong public engagement. I am committed to continuing this work, ensuring continuity, and seeing through vital reforms to improve outcomes for everyone in our community.

We also need a comprehensive review of Primary Care, how it's delivered and how it's funded. At the start of last term, a Primary Care Review was set up and began work to examine the current provision, but unfortunately, the resources allocated to that work-stream were taken away from HSC and consequently it completely stalled.

With the prices of GP visits soaring and many people worried about the cost of seeing a doctor we must re-start that workstream. At HSC we have made some changes to prescribing regulations in order to allow other professionals to issue prescriptions, but it is a big piece of work that requires a great deal of Pharmaceutical resource, and those people also have their 'business as usual' job to do alongside any transformation work. Addressing the rising cost of Primary Care and ensuring that there is equitable access for everyone is a must and we need to reinvigorate this piece of work and prioritise the resources needed.

Alarmingly, divisive and discriminatory rhetoric continues to surface, particularly on social media, undermining the inclusive values we hold dear.

Guernsey has a proud history of being a welcoming and open community. For generations, we have relied on and embraced guest workers who have helped us build the vibrant society we enjoy today. Their contributions are not only valuable - they are essential. We must show gratitude, not hostility, to those who step forward to fill vital roles that cannot be filled locally.

We must redouble our efforts to challenge discrimination wherever it exists, to promote understanding and respect, and to ensure our laws and our culture reflect the best of who we are. Let us stand together for a Guernsey that is fair, inclusive, and proud.

Manifesto summary: The island needs to get BACK TO BASICS with real priorities. HOUSING, HEALTH, EDUCATION, ECONOMY & TAX. With 26+ years States experience my interest in politics has not waned. Having sat in the public gallery for all but one States meeting over the last 4 ½ year term I have seen the issues which need addressing, except can kicking happened. The island cannot afford a repeat of another 4yrs, real priorities must be dealt with. We must continue to bear down on expenditure and to pursue efficiencies. Even so, there is no escaping the fact the States have to raise more money to pay for our essential public services.

Dear Elector

Designing policies and producing reports is often the easy bit, compared with finding the money and bringing the plans into effect. Delays reached a high level once it became obvious funds were not available. Many of the approved reports included costs at an extortionate amount from using **consultants** beyond our shores when the **talent available on island** with **local knowledge** is excluded far too often. This has to change and reflect confidence in local businesses and expertise thereby keeping the money on island. Many tough decisions and action must take place this term.

HOUSING The lack of action addressing the housing crisis has been stark. It's also embarrassing how the States criticise developers for stockpiling land with the potential for 1500+ homes when the States has the largest land bank. The States must step in and use their own land to build more affordable and social housing. As well as easing the current shortfall in housing it should encourage locals, as an example, our young people who left the island for University to return and contribute to island life and the community.

Listing the Castel Hospital tied up the site and **needs to be reversed.** With so much States land, building affordable or social houses gives the potential for some homes to have gardens instead of people living in high rise flats which has been suggested. Why should those on lower income be housed in high rise flats when the States has enough land to build homes like, for example, Courtil St Jacques.

Quality of life remains important, cramming people into small places has the potential for social problems in the future. The north of the island cannot take much more development, it's looking overdeveloped in parts.

Planning applications each week have many wanting to extend their properties. This is understandable owing to the high cost of properties available. But as a result many of the one or two bedroom 'starter homes' including small cottages are removed for those desperately wanting to get on the property ladder. The void needs to be filled by the States if they are going to help first time buyers.

EDUCATION, SPORT & CULTURE (ESC) Educational outcomes must be a priority before buildings, our education system needs to excel and receive the necessary resources to do so. Investing in children's education benefits all.

Moving the Sixth Form Centre students to La Mare de Carteret High School supposedly for 1 year, then 2 yrs now more likely 5 yrs wasn't the best decision by ESC especially when it now turns out the Sixth Form Centre at Les Varendes will be used to accommodate ESC staff. I have concerns for the students during exam time with all this disruption when it's so vital they have stability and continuity.

The La Mare de Carteret Primary rebuild has now been taken off the prioritisation list whilst waiting for the outstanding primary school review. At least two ESC Committees over two terms have yet to do this work. In the meantime, teaching staff, pupils and parents still remain unsure what will happen to their school.

Not enough time by ESC has been spent promoting and investing in **sport and the arts**. As well as the benefits to health and well-being involving both, it would also help our hospitality/retail sector with sports/arts tourism there for the taking. For this reason, I would like to see a **Sports & Art Committee re-established**.

HEALTH. Delaying the hospital extension would be a retrograde step, it must be seen as one of the priorities. It is unthinkable if barriers are put in place restricting access to health by wealth and I will continue to oppose any policies/charges that could result in a two-tier health system depending on the ability to pay.

The message the island needs to address the 'ageing demographic' problem sends out an unfortunate message to those who worked hard making this island successful. They should not be seen as a problem. There will unarguably be a cost as there are more older people relative to younger workers. But many older people are very active helping parents by looking after grandchildren, older relatives or friends and providing invaluable help with voluntary community services.

Long-Term Care Insurance scheme commenced 20yrs ago, ensuring individuals no longer had to worry about their future care needs by using home equity against care costs. Before the scheme was in place people would find a way around the system by transferring property in name only to family members, or put the property into a company or trust. If the States do go down the route of charging against the property once sold, I believe the same avoidance will happen, typically by the better off who are used to dealing with financial and legal professionals.

I would like to see **legislation** in place covering **food allergies** as more and more people are being diagnosed with at times life threatening allergies. Legislation exists in Jersey and the UK, which we should follow.

ECONOMY/TAX Throughout my previous time in the States, I was known for keeping a close eye out for unnecessary spending and waste within the Committees. We must continue to bear down on expenditure and to pursue efficiencies. But even so, there is no escaping the fact that we have to raise more money to pay for our essential public services.

The States approved a **GST PLUS PACKAGE**, and **not GST** in isolation. The GST Plus package will raise money annually from companies, thousands of visitors and the wealthiest quarter of local households. The **PACKAGE**, which includes changes to social security and tax allowance will benefit low and middle income earners. Seven out of 10 households will be better off. I do believe that food and children's clothes should be exempt from the tax. An amendment would help to freeze the agreed GST figure for a set number of years ensuring the rate wasn't abused by the States spending on 'nice to have schemes'. Unless something viable is produced without long delays, I will back the GST package.

Raising funds in some form of a **States Investment Bond for people to invest in**, needs further consideration.

The difficulties travelling to the island with unreliable transport connectivity hasn't helped our economy. The States need to recognise the **airport & harbour are our gateways to the island and benefits the economy.** If it means subsidising or reducing fees this should take place. Once passengers are here the subsidy would be recuperated by those spending on island benefiting the **retail/hospitality sector**.

An INTER-ISLAND FERRY taking vehicles once a week is not enough. Solutions need to be found. The new passenger-only service is great, but those wishing to take vehicles to Jersey are unable to do so. This not only affects holidays in Jersey, but the motor racing fraternity/horse boxes/animals can no longer be transported in vehicles, unless they charter a ferry. Guernsey is also losing out on Jersey people coming here and those from the UK who used to visit both islands for a short break with their vehicles. They can no longer do this unless it's for a week waiting for an inter-island ferry.

Moving **cruise line passengers** to the Albert pier saw a reduction in visitors previously walking through the town into shops with some on their way to the bus terminus for the round island bus routes. As smaller cruise ships can now enter the harbour, cannot all tenders revert to the ro-ro ramp side where passengers have more space to walk to Liberation Monument away from traffic on the piers and walk through town helping our **retail & hospitality** sector?

As shareholders of **AURIGNY** the States must address reliability with them as it's costing the island dearly

The local cottage industries on show at Seafront Sundays has to be welcomed and encouraged along with small startup/pop-up shops, all contributing to our economy. **All local retail**, wherever positioned across the island, **needs our support**, money spent on-island helps us all.

A **YOUTH STATES MEETINGS** was held in the Royal Court with the Bailiff and myself as Mother of the House. Participants took part from across all the High Schools and Private Colleges. This was an extremely successful day. I would like to see a Youth States Meeting reinstated and held annually. The youth are our future, it's their island.

RELOCATION PACKAGES need to be reviewed. The island is losing out on locals coming back as they are exempt from the generous packages given to those moving here on a permit.

CHARITIES - it's important that States & Charity groups meet quarterly and work together.

A review of the **POPULATION MANAGEMENT** will need to take place, if tweaks or changes need to be made there will be enough evidence and data, plus feedback from the community, this will all contribute.

ENVIRONMENT Solar panels and heat pumps have been used on States premises with many more sites expected, once funds are available. Businesses and individuals have also seen the benefit installing these.

Form an independent SCRUTINY & PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE, not including politicians.

THE GOVERNMENT BELONGS TO THE PEOPLE, it's up to the people to decide what voting system they would like. Parish Deputies? District Deputies? or a mix of Island Wide and Parish Deputies? The public must decide. A referendum must be prepared soon after this election

States members voted to award themselves £4,000 if they lose their seat. Yet they know before standing as a candidate it's for a set term. I would welcome the next pay review reducing members pay and removing this £4k payment. What happened to public service? Being a States member is about service to the community not what you can get out of the community financially or otherwise.

I was elected as a States Deputy continuously from April 1994 - October 2020, yet I'm still contacted by members of the community seeking my help, which I have been pleased to give, using the knowledge and contacts gained through my time in the States.

Political parties split the States last term by pitching against one another causing tension and backbiting. Where has the respect gone to agree to disagree? Personalities rather than the system has been a problem I still support our independent consensus system.

When **States members served a 3yr term** we saw more action, it meant they needed to get on with things. 4yrs has seen a lot of coasting with little action and decisions. Time to revert to 3yrs? Time to review?

Through regular interactions to engage, listen and discuss with representative groups through interaction touch points would help to maintain a feedback dialogue of understanding and awareness.

- 9. <u>Channel Islands Collaboration</u> Guernsey's population is c.64,000 and Jersey's is c.107,000.
- Separately both are sub-optimally sized, but working together can produce realistic advantages of synergy and opportunity to present themselves.

A Channel Island partnership would be advantageous for mutually reducing costs in selected specific, shared service areas and for better external-reach marketing initiatives, through the collaboration across the Islands.

Manifesto Summary

If you're struggling with the number of candidates in this election you're not alone. How to choose from amongst so many? I stand on the same values and my record since being elected as a new deputy in 2020. I've kept my commitments and voted according to my principles, and I'll continue if re-elected. I've brought some fresh thinking to the States, but I want a more open government with greater accountability. Maintaining our competitive position is key for business, but I support islanders who struggle with rising costs of living and housing. We must not lose Guernsey's unique identity.

Personal Statement

I am proudly standing as an independent, with my own ideas. I have lived in Guernsey most of my life, building a 27-year career as a software developer. My partner Natasha and I live in St Martin's with our 9-year-old son Ted. After being elected, I decided to work for **you** full-time as a States member, to concentrate on issues that matter to islanders. Having worked in technology within banking, fund administration, the public sector and insurance, and earned my business degree locally with the GTA, I have a broad view of industry in Guernsey.

Education issues inspired me to seek election for my first term. All parents want the best for their children, and many share similar concerns about the direction of education. This political term has seen divisions open up in the assembly, and our island feels more divided than ever. Cutting short the education review and pushing through with the worst of all options was a low point of this States. With pupil numbers falling it's clear that a more considerate approach to education is needed. My deepest concern now is how the shortage of housing has developed into a serious crisis. Young people wonder if they have a future in the island, and the high cost of living affects people of all ages.

I had seen politics close up when my father was Deputy in St Peter Port for many years (Rhoderick Matthews for those that remember) but this States has been the most divisive. I believe in working together to find common ground. We need a way through that allows young people to stay on the island, and the retired to have the support they need. Families should be able to afford to stay on the island where they grow up, but our services and business need skills from outside too. The balance isn't right at the moment, change is needed if Guernsey is to remain a great place to call your home.

Housing

Guernsey has a serious housing crisis. It's always been difficult here, but now it's worse than it's ever been. The States has the tools to help islanders but hasn't worked effectively or together as a unit to get results.

- Planning needs to allocate areas for development that can go ahead quickly. Brownfield should always come first before losing more of our precious green spaces.
- The North of the island has taken too much recent development and too high proportion of recent housing proposals, it's time to find other locations around the island, our land use policy shouldn't stand in the way.
- A new housing commission using local construction industry know-how could help deliver more homes and suggest improvements to States policies.

- Modular buildings and other new technologies should be part of the mix to get homes completed more quickly, and provide emergency housing needs.
- Set up States-run schemes to help first time buyers save up for a deposit with tax deductions for young people trying to get on the first rung on the ladder.
- Savings schemes will help some, but the States Loan scheme helped many islanders in the past with low deposits, we should set up a new scheme for today.
- The rental market needs fair housing standards, protections for tenants, and help to stabilise the very high rent increases and availability shortages.



Population

As much as we need new housing, we can't out build the housing crisis. States population policy isn't working. The guide number for net migration is already high at 300 per year but during 2023 actual net migration was higher at 1064.

- The Population Management Law needs an overhaul.
- High net migration leads to price increases and lack of availability, especially in the rental market.
- The new Housing Committee should take responsibility to manage migration, and aim for better balance with house building. The rule should be licences are limited relative to new builds.
- Rules which limit subsidies and key-worker accommodation only to States recruits from overseas need to be reconsidered, it's not fair to locally qualified residents who also struggle with these costs.

Education

Our State secondary schools have been through too much turmoil during the last few years. I opposed closure of the previous Grammar School and La Mare de Carteret schools, creating the school at Les Varendes. The task ahead will be to improve education services for all ages from pre-school through to 16+ and adult education.

- Expanding pre-school provision supports working parents, a review of Primary schools needs to consider innovative solutions, not just closures to save costs.
- Secondary schools should be able to make their own decisions, not be run centrally by the Education Office.
- We should be inspired by top performing schools in the UK yet develop solutions suitable for our small island.
- All schools should be able to create their own identity, not merge toward one standard. Parental choice and competition drive up individual school standards.
- Education needs to repair its relationship with the independent Colleges. The old scholarship scheme should be brought back but in a new format. Means tested bursaries, for parents who can't afford fees would deliver greater social mobility.
- The current Sixth form centre should not be used for office space for civil servants. Instead keep options open for a return to its use as an 11-18 school.

Health

Guernsey has high quality healthcare but there are many improvements needed. Having served on the committee for HSC, I can vouch for the efforts made to keep services at the standards we expect.

- Waiting times must be brought down, especially in areas such as orthopaedics.
- In the UK we can see the NHS is struggling from underinvestment, we must expand our services to cope with increasing demand, we only have one hospital.
- The first phase of the PEH modernisation has been progressed, now the next phase is needed to provide for increases which come with an ageing population.
- Recruitment is needed to cope with rising demand, but housing is the biggest challenge. Accommodation is desperately needed to avoid dependence on relocation allowances.
- Safeguarding standards in all areas have improved but more needs to be done to address concerns.
- Locally qualified nurses and healthcare workers should be encouraged, including help with housing and the cost of living.
- Mental health and increasing provision for neurodiversity are high among my priorities. We know demand
 is growing and attitudes are changing.

Tax

I voted against the GST+ package, but it has now been voted through. Inflation caused price rises that shocked everyone, and GST will add to this, but the package does protect those on low and middle incomes. I will vote for viable alternatives that come forward. If GST cannot be stopped, an important task ahead will be to keep the lowest rates possible.

- Guernsey has had a shortfall in its tax revenue since the "zero ten" tax changes were introduced in 2008. This is the point where our problems started, it's time to look again at corporate tax reform.
- Our tax system remains unbalanced, companies and some of our wealthy residents are able to pay little tax by using the 0% rate for corporate tax. Tax fairness is needed.
- Raise the rate of corporate tax to 15% and close loopholes to achieve greater balance and fairness.
- Official estimates of revenue from "pillar 2" were found to be too low once before, they could be again. There is too much uncertainty in our revenue projections.
- Spending control is needed to achieve a balanced budget. The budget must be balanced, we cannot continue to spend more than we take in.
- Preventing the need for GST is a priority but may not be possible. Some of these steps can keep GST at a lower rate, and it should never be applied to essentials like food.
- The tax office needs to revise its processes and improve customer service, such as making paper forms easily available for anyone who struggles with the online page.

Economy

- Guernsey's enviable position as a global finance centre provides much of our employment and inward investment. We should support its growth and development and our competitive position.
- Our visitor economy needs support with improved connectivity.
- The digital economy is developing, Al brings opportunities and challenges.
- Regulation can be a strength for the island to protect our reputation on the world stage, and at the same time minimise the cost of compliance.



Environment

Protecting our island's natural environment is of vital importance for future generations here, but so is the global environment. Our impact may be small, but we still need to play our part and encourage others to do so too.

- Keep green spaces in areas where people live, work and enjoy, and protect our unique biodiversity protected.
- Our energy strategy and net-zero policy is much less costly than for other countries, due to our lack of heavy industry and planned improvements to our links with the electricity grid in France.
- We can move forwards with renewable energy generation, through offshore wind which shows real promise of delivering results and revenue earnings.
- In the future, tidal energy too, though technology in this area is not as production-ready as offshore wind power.
- Our drinking water must stay clean and free of pollution from "forever chemicals" like PFAS, and pesticides.
- States decisions must balance the environment with the economy and community in ways that create benefit for all of us, and minimise any downsides.

Transport

Getting around the island and traveling off it is becoming more difficult, with responsibility is divided among many committees making decisions complicated.

- Air and sea links remain poor. Public ownership of Aurigny provides stability and routes have expanded, but if problems persist and costs remain high a new approach will be needed to remain competitive.
- Harbours and the airport should be run separately to improve efficiency and stand on their own. Boat owners should not be made to subsidise the airport.
- Our roads are narrow and congested, but improving the alternatives works better than trying to frustrate drivers into leaving their cars at home.
- Too many roads are dangerous for children and older people to walk, and difficult for cycling by all but the most experienced cyclists.
- The way dangerous roads are prioritised is too opaque. Some could be improved with pavements or become one way, whilst others are already safe enough to increase their speed limits.
- I would not support paid parking unless fair and convenient schemes come forward. Innovative solutions such as congestion charging are more efficient. Parking fines must not become a profit centre.

Political Experience

I have been a hard-working deputy, playing a full role on two principal committees: Health and Social Care (HSC) and Environment and Infrastructure (E&I).

I have taken on constituency work and helped to bring changes to the way the States approaches business on behalf of individuals who have contacted me for advice. One of the most challenging areas of work as a deputy as little support is provided to members, but very important.

Assembly Achievements

Some successful amendments I proposed and were passed:

- ✓ Enable the use of modular homes as emergency accommodation, alongside future construction worker village development. We must do everything we can.
- Preventing school fines from being introduced for parents when children are absent from school, in the form of fixed penalties. These fines have no place here, parents need help not penalties. This idea was copied from the UK where they have been a failure, and only led to parents feeling more victimised by authorities.
- ✓ Kept mortgage income tax relief, rather than phasing it out. Homeowners are under pressure from high interest rates, some mortgage holders rely on this tax relief.

Accountability

Finding out what the States is doing on your behalf is of vital importance in a functioning democracy.

- I support a Freedom of Information Law to bring full transparency. It's our information, it should always be made available to those with a legitimate interest.
- A return of the Public Accounts Committee, or a new Audit Commission, will help build trust in how the States spends money on your behalf, with outside eyes to review the details of work being done.
- I will press for a 'duty of candour' for all public employees. Backed by law to prevent the withholding of important information from those who need to know, something that unfortunately does occur in the States. The UK government is progressing this, to help combat high profile scandals where information was not passed on to those who could act on it.

Law & Order

We're lucky to live in a safe island, but important issues made little progress as Brexit and the Moneyval assessment took priority.

- Sentencing policy appears too lenient for crimes such as for child sex offences, whilst harsh for others such as drug offences. A justice review must address this.
- I support Canadian style regulation of legal cannabis.
- Complaints should be handled more efficiently.
- Our narrow roads can feel dangerous, safety standards need enforcement to keep walkers and cyclists safe.



Reform

Our current system depends on 'consensus' so deputies have to work together to get results. Unpopular or poorly thought through proposals, brought with little support, cause division and can lead to 'deadlock' where nothing moves forwards. The system delivers stability, but with the wrong approach can also make changing direction difficult to achieve. It's not fair to place all the blame for slow progress with the committee system. Lack of internal resources makes sweeping change slow to start and get moving too.

- Successful candidates in this election will go into the current system. Those who co-operate and look to find common ground can deliver change and progress.
- Improvements need to be designed and thought through properly, not just rushed in.
- Executive government could deliver more decisive change if designed well, but if not then could be worse for the island's democracy.
- I support changes the bring more democratic accountability, but not those that make matters worse.
- Changes to our island wide elections and voting system should be included, not dealt with separately.
- I will support a reduction in the number of deputies if it can be shown that there are proper checks and balances.
- We shouldn't try to copy ideas from other democracies if the ideas won't work well for Guernsey. We need to find our own solutions that work for our unique island.

Additionally, the Duchess of Kent House, located just a few hundred yards away from the Princess Elizabeth Hospital, could be repurposed into essential accommodation for nursing and healthcare staff — an increasingly urgent need for our growing elderly population.

By utilising public assets wisely, we can demonstrate real leadership and tangible progress — delivering results for islanders and laying the groundwork for Guernsey's regeneration.

NO to GST – Then, Now, Always

I have opposed a Goods and Services Tax (GST) for 5 years and nothing has changed to alter that view.

Five Priorities for 2025 - 29

1. Tackle the Housing Crisis

Cut through the States' planning bureaucracy that slows down private developments and give the Guernsey Housing Association the tools to accelerate the construction of affordable and key worker homes.

2. Improve Travel Connectivity

As an economic enabler directly impacting our cost of living, we must ensure that transportation routes are reliable, seats and freight are affordable, and Guernsey remains open for business and family life.

3. Strengthen Immigration Laws

Update our regime to ensure that people moving to Guernsey to live or work are net fiscal contributors, fairly contributing to our economy and public services, thereby sustaining growth without burdening taxpayers.

4. Generating income from an Offshore Wind Farm

Since writing the Offshore Wind Scoping Report, which detailed this opportunity, I have spent two-and-a-half years developing this potentially game-changing initiative.

Assuming we build out the full 610 km² of viable seabed. Based on independent experts' calculations, the lease income could be over £150 million a year - around twice the revenue of a 5 % GST and a 10 % rise in income tax combined. The first receipts are expected to be available by 2027, before the proposed introduction of GST. Add in related corporate taxation and local supply chain considerations, and you are looking at adding tens of millions more, along with around 200 skilled jobs. Furthermore, it will enable Guernsey to make a disproportionately large contribution to mitigating human-induced climate change, a clear threat to future generations.

We have lost at least fifteen months due to political obstruction by some pro-GST Deputies. We now need a fully resourced programme, free from political foot-dragging, to secure revenue and local jobs without delay.

5. Embed Transparency & Accountability

This is essential for any government that wishes to maintain the confidence and support of its community. Guernsey is sadly lacking in the mechanisms to enable this. We need to:

- Introduce a Freedom of Information Law
- Establish an independent Ombudsman for administrative complaints.
- Reinstate an independent Public Accounts Committee to scrutinise public expenditure.

As Chair of the Administrative Decision Review Board, the ultimate body responsible for hearing complaints regarding States administrative failures, I have seen how our current processes are not fit for purpose.

Manifesto Summary

Guernsey is my adopted home since 1995. My background is within the financial services sector with experience in investment banking (both commercial and regulatory).

My wish is to represent the residents of the Bailiwick in all aspects of daily life, to bring leadership and understanding to current affairs through listening to ideas/concerns, and influencing decision-making (directly and accountably), to enable the Island and its people to continue to thrive.

Within government, I intend to focus on three particular areas: <u>health/social care</u>, <u>education</u> and <u>treasury functions</u>, thus effecting positive changes for all age groups and funding policies to ensure they happen.

What I can bring to the role as your States of Guernsey Deputy

I am a dual national (UK/USA) and came to Guernsey in 1995 to join the Guernsey Financial Services Commission (GFSC) as Deputy Director of Investment Business (a new post) during which time I established the Channel Islands Stock Exchange LBG (CISX, now TISE) among working on other infrastructure projects. My point of view at the time (as it is still my view), one cannot be an international finance centre and compete with other such centers without proper infrastructure such as a stock exchange, a central bank and a treasury function – alongside a robust regulatory regime.

As CEO and Founding Director of the CISX (now TISE), from 1998 to 2013, I brought together varied financial services expertise to successfully position the CISX at the heart of the financial services industry in the Channel Islands, increasing the appeal of the Islands for financial services business and helping to consolidate their position as leading international finance centres. The CISX attracted wide international recognition, was a well-regulated and a highly regarded international business, which was also commercially sound and profitable, with excellent prospects for continued innovation and future growth. The CISX systems and procedures were robust, well-developed and independently tested. Its regulatory performance was the subject of reviews by the International Monetary Fund (reports of which are available online).

The CISX success is indicative of my strengths, which may be best summarised as strategic planning and business development, recurring themes throughout my career. While at the GFSC, my role as Deputy Director of Investment Business was a new position within the Commission and I was instrumental in developing a number of initiatives including the Class Q Professional Investor Fund, Protected Cell Company legislation (applicable to the investment business sector) and the formation of the CISX. There was a considerable amount of cross-sector representation in my work and I was involved in developing a regulatory framework for a number of projects within the Insurance, Fiduciary and Banking sectors as well as general governance matters, training and promotion.

As a Director of Les Bourgs Hospice, I was involved with its £5million redevelopment project, which was privately funded through individual and corporate sponsorship. The Patron at the time was HRH The Prince of Wales (currently our Patron is His Excellency The Lieutenant Governor), opened the new Hospice at Andrew Mitchell House in St Andrews; the building itself attracted numerous accolades for its design. It was a hugely rewarding and an essential development project for the local community.

Les Bourgs Hospice provides an essential service to the Bailiwick and I am privileged and very proud to be a part of the organisation to ensure it continues to bring quality end of life care for those within the community.

I have had a long held interest in philanthropy and projects which can bring about sustainable change for the betterment of society. In this regard, I have been involved in a number of other Guernsey based non-profit organizations to increase funding and influence strategic development. Throughout my business career, I have always had a keen interest towards developing the arts in Guernsey – whether in music circles (singing with the Choral Society, Chamber Choir and Town Church Choir), the arts (as Commissioner of Guernsey Arts Commission) – as well as in education (helping to shape the Guernsey Training Agency in its formative years) – and the establishment of Guernsey's promotional agency (now Guernsey Finance).

With my broad based knowledge and experience, I believe I am well positioned to add value as your Deputy within the States of Deliberation, particularly in relation to strategic thinking and leadership in the areas of health/social care, education and treasury functions. As more and more red tape and legal process is visited on the local population the spirit of Guernsey being sucked out of the local population, or those that are left. The ever expanding Government is at the expense of front-line services and our very freedoms that were acknowledged in spectacular style on the 80th Liberation Day celebrations, which everyone agreed celebrated the true spirit of Guernsey.

As the local population dwindles and locals can't see a future where they can have a rewarding career, a happy family life with a home, security and enjoy all that Guernsey has to offer, and would rather leave the island (or in some cases are given no option with the lack of support from CS) I felt I had to at least try to do something to address these problems and assist in remodelling Guernsey as a place locals can recognise of old and see a home and a future for them and their families once more without feeling like outsiders in their own communities.

Housing

States land and that banked by GHA to be released to provide emergency housing and a provision for the homeless, followed by a programme of land release to provide locals opportunity to buy a plot and build their own property within the scope of a scheme.

No speculators.

No building on greenbelt nor vineries that are in good repair. Full complete survey of all residential and commercial property to establish what is empty and why. Large commercial buildings that remain empty should be considered for residential accommodation like in UK at reasonable rental. Ensure that locals are provided rental properties as a first option ahead of anyone

else. Ensure local communities and village areas are not over developed and all have access to allotments for growing and green space for healthy outdoor activity.

Bring back the previous local/open market system where local market was only available for locals and those on licences had to buy/rent at a high TRP or similar, and no speculation by those outside the island.

Education & Training

Education should be broad and geared toward providing a solid foundation without the need to push the political ideologies of the moment and provide a skills-based education with the addition of knowledge learning, such that people do not feel the need to home school or pay the fees for private colleges. Provide the excellence that was previously delivered in the state sector at the former Grammar School.

- Provide more practical lessons in school and explore the benefits of school meals and nutritionally beneficial offerings in school premises.

Economic Growth & Taxation

Identify business sectors which would benefit our economy and focus on how to bring those businesses to Guernsey (eg E businesses, more captives, more asset management & compliance offerings).

As a volunteer in St Peter Port as Senior Constable I have championed team working with my fellow Constable, the Dean and Vice Dean and ensured that we have the right mix of skills to deliver services.

Views on Key Issues:

I believe that what we need to do, at pace, is prioritise what is viable in the next term and concentrate on those issues whilst making it clear that some actions will be short, some medium and others long term.

- Seek to address Education, Health and Social Care gaps.
- 2. Support sustained economic and business growth particularly support for small and medium businesses.
- Seek to address taxation gaps, address long term housing issues and high costs of living for families, youngsters and those who are not wealthy. Support workforce retention and recruitment.
- Sustain global connectivity, tourism and transport with a priority early on for ports and airports in a climate of environmental stability.

I don't have all the answers, and I won't make any promises. Individual Deputies need to achieve consensus. I believe that an Assembly that is committed to working together with others, can and should find both long term solutions and some outcomes resolved at a faster pace particularly when much of the groundwork has been achieved.

I am in favour of government and civil service reform with a view to reducing costs, more joined up thinking and would support making better use of the expertise and willingness found in businesses, charities and the Douzaines.

Seek to address Education, Health and Social Care gaps:

I have been a teacher here and in the UK. I opened a school for autistic youngsters and developed strategic policy and practice in Portsmouth as a Director of Education working across children's services.

The Children's Trust in the UK was a mix of health education and social care staff, with

joint budgets for some projects. We found that support for vulnerable families with teams from each of the disciplines began to make a big difference. Identified families received support from some or all three disciplines. I would favour a move to joint services for children, adults and families with joint budgets. I would favour strategies to reduce agency costs and gaps in service. I welcome the on-island training offered by the Guernsey Institute (TGI) and its 'can do' attitude providing alternatives for people rather than leaving the island.

I have been a non-voting member on the committee for Education, Sports and Culture (ESC) and have been congratulated on the service I have given to the committee. I have been a member of two school committees and eight school interim governance boards (IGB) helping to develop the strategy, with a view to further devolving of services. I would welcome leading on projects; I can be instrumental in reviewing Primary Provision in the light of falling roles and do more to devolve funding to Headteacher and governing bodies as they bed into the new system.

Our population is increasingly aging, and my own mother is 92, in Bournemouth and suffering from dementia. Our family have struggled to find appropriate care and have made many sacrifices to ensure she is well looked after. Our demographic here is aging with falling birth rates. We should design a digital strategy that supports a healthy aging population who contribute to the island's economy, and encourages young families to live and stay here.

Support sustained economic and business growth including support for small and medium businesses:

We need to work together and stop undermining our island talent and beauty!

We should be an attractive proposition for businesses, and yet retention and recruitment, particularly in Healthcare and Education and the service sector are struggling. Wages are higher, taxes are lower, there is less crime and the lifestyle available to support families is second to none and we should advertise this more comprehensively when recruiting.

I would encourage partnership working to advocate for Guernsey's unique strengths and heritage as a group of islands. The Finance industry is crucial for us economically. We have some skilful people working hard to retain and attract business, but there are too many projects, each with too little money to achieve their ideals in a constantly changing and costly market. Prioritisation of projects is essential, early on, in the new Assembly.

As Constable, I have been encouraging work with local partners in town to provide innovation spaces for those that are self-employed or running a small to medium enterprise (SME's) and looking to grow and expand.

I have engaged with small and large businesses and have started to encourage niche shops, whilst recognising that risk can be high and costly for those who are self-employed. My partner was self-employed, and I have experienced the feast and famine nature of income generation particularly when sickness intervenes, or a break is required.

I would support this initiative by giving grants, phased tax breaks and encourage owners of empty premises to reduce rents until businesses were up and running.

Seeking to address taxation, address long-term housing issues and high costs of living for families, youngsters and those who are not wealthy impacting on workforce retention and recruitment:

'Nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes' - Benjamin Franklin

Taxes are inevitable and complex. Council tax in the UK for a three-bedroom home in a good area could be from £2000 per annum (PA) upwards. Income tax over an income of £50,271 is 40% PA and VAT is 20% on goods and services. We are so lucky over here, but funds are running low. Cost of living is higher than some jurisdictions in some parts of life but lower in others. Housing costs for buyers and renters is proving a block for recruitment and retention

with high agency costs as a result. I applaud the work of the Guernsey Housing Association (GHA), but affordable housing is almost impossible with the high costs of land and its clearance. I would favour more States owned land released for public or private enterprise to build either high cost properties releasing houses at the lower end, more over-55 villages releasing family houses and some cap on rents whilst ensuring a fair return for landlords with tax relief for property maintenance.

How do we increase funds? GST and GSTplus has appeared unpopular but if not those, potentially small income tax rises, scales of payment depending on income or corporation tax.

I would favour a mix of measures with priority for those on low income. We need to agree and act together to sustain or implement change. There are different views on Zero 10 and corporate taxes but I'm mindful that we need to be careful in the current climate about forcing a mass exodus of the very industries that are our heart and lungs, whilst attracting investment.

I would support the scrutinising of contracts to ensure better value for money and start conversations about business rates to help start-ups.

We should ensure that our global reach, connectivity and reputation will benefit our Bailiwick. The rollout of fibre in our homes and the digital strategy in our schools is to be applauded and we must keep up the pace to compete in a modern world. We should take advantage of the latest thinking inclusive of Artificial Intelligence (AI). I have a master's degree in information technology and have kept up with my skill set. I am innovative and enjoy sharing ideas with others and helping them come to fruition.

Sustain global connectivity, tourism and transport with a priority early on for ports and airports cognisant of environmental stability:

We should update the comprehensive 10 point plan already in place for Guernsey tourism published in 2020, to champion our tourism and culture industry. Our policies are clear, but we need to focus on encouraging and rewarding fewer journeys by car making it easier and more enjoyable to be out and about in our island, whilst accepting that an aging population may not be able to travel far on foot or by bicycle.

The recent won contract for our ferries is proving to be successful but there are gaps in provision. Our airplane reliability is not yet secure for this island or Alderney and must still be a priority to service businesses, sport and tourism.

The cost of family holidays to the island is certainly unfavourable when compared to the low cost of package holidays and there is considerable work to be done in this area. We have some of the most beautiful landscapes, beaches, cliffs and historic buildings with a stunning entrance to the harbour surrounded by our picturesque islands. Let's market this more effectively. The notable increase in French visitors has been welcomed with Brittany ferries advertising and scheduling day trips.

As a Douzaine our plan is to make town a more attractive place. We are replacing the festoon lighting, have refurbished the old quarter sign and Candie Cemetery gates. Our unique Pissoire and our water pumps are on a schedule to be refreshed. We are working with partners including the prison, to refurbish, replace and provide more seating for those who find it more difficult to walk from one end of town to the other. I am part of the trust to sustain the town lights and hoping to attract small businesses into town. I have been part of the planning for Liberation Day and worked with the Royal

Guernsey Light Infantry (RGLI) linking to Masnieres in France. I am a good team player. I am well versed in researching and assimilating facts and focused on the priorities identified for Guernsey.

I would be a new Deputy so would be ready to learn from those who are more experienced but sitting on ESC as a non-voting member has given me a good insight into next steps. I am ready to take them.

Education / Skills

I believe that it is important that students leave our schools / colleges with a strong academic skill set so that they can fill local roles across a diverse range of industry sectors. I support investment into Health and Social care and want to ensure that we can look after everyone, particularly our ageing population and our most vulnerable residents.

Balancing the Books

Unless we do something, we will run out of money - quickly.

The government must continue to look for efficiencies and savings, but they alone will not close the fiscal deficit so we must find new ways to generate revenue.

My values are rooted in lifelong learning, fairness, and open-mindedness. Working with young people for decades has shown me how connected our challenges are, and how much strength lies in our local communities. I am optimistic about Guernsey's future: we can work together, take ownership of our problems and build a better tomorrow.

For 30 years I have been a teacher in Guernsey's public sector, since returning home in 1995. I have represented teachers through the National Education Union and chaired the Negotiating Committee for Teachers and Lecturers; these roles have taught me how honest communication and compromise are essential. I have also served for many years on the Guernsey Rowing Club committee, gaining insight into the vital role our clubs and societies play in community cohesion.

Faster, Smarter, More Respectful Politics

Our political system must evolve. I am openminded about reducing the number of deputies or adopting a more executive form of government. While parties may eventually emerge, the urgent need is to shift the culture. We must promote collaboration, early input on policy and fewer last-minute amendments.

I have worked with many civil servants who are incredibly dedicated, but structural inefficiencies persist. We must support the new Chief Executive and Head of Public Service in driving reform.

Public debate also needs improvement. Social media is no substitute for open, informed discussion. Parish-based "citizens' assemblies" and our community forums can help build trust and broaden participation. Democracy only works when people feel heard and involved.

A Healthier, Happier Guernsey

Everyday we see how mental health challenges affect young people. If students cannot attend school, their prospects shrink. But we must distinguish between diagnosable mental illness and the normal challenges of growing up. Support should be practical and help people return to education, work and life.

This means supporting school counselling, digital literacy and more parental involvement. We need honest conversations about the effects of smartphones and social media. I support a community-led ban on smartphones for primary-age children; not out of moral panic but genuine concern for their well-being.

Our new multi-agency collaborative model is vital for early intervention. Preventative approaches improve lives and save money. Supporting vulnerable people early must remain a core priority.

Guernsey's voluntary sector is our island's super-power; from charities to arts and sports clubs, these groups play a huge role in improving our lives. Government needs to do more to harness their expertise and support them.

Guernsey is rightly proud of its hardworking healthcare staff. However, we must not be complacent; we must support our Health and Social Care services to plan for our changing demographic profile in the coming years.

Education: Our Island's Foundation

My experience in education has shown how damaging political indecision can be. The chaos over the past 10 years has harmed students' opportunities. This turmoil must not happen again, in education or elsewhere.

Excellent education is a moral and economic necessity. People are our greatest resource and we must help to unlock everyone's potential. The secondary sector has undergone major change; now we must support our schools to foster ambition and raise aspirations. Disruption caused by poor behaviour should not hold anyone back. We need to attract and retain committed teachers by making their work more rewarding and sustainable.

Culture is key to success in schools, but they cannot build it alone. The move towards governing bodies is a step in the right direction, but families and the wider community must engage too. Everyone shares responsibility for supporting our young people.

Ofsted has judged our primary schools to be good but further progress is needed. A review of primary provision must avoid the mistakes of the secondary sector reform.

Post-16, we must complete the Further Education campus on time and support the Sixth Form Centre at La Mare until it moves to its permanent home. Physical infrastructure does matter alongside culture, consistency and leadership.

Housing: A Home for All

The phrase "Priced out of Paradise" originated in Hawaii but resonates in Guernsey too. Our housing crisis is not unique, but it is severe. Affordability, access and suitability all need urgent attention.

The 2023 Guernsey Housing Plan rightly aims for affordable, secure and efficient housing for all. It identified "systemic market failure" – a finding few would contest. Now we must act. We must support local first-time buyers, allow smart use of Statesowned land and review our planning restrictions.

We also must address the specific needs of key workers, older people and young families. There are no easy answers; but we cannot delay.

Our Economy: Dare to Grow


To ensure long-term prosperity, we need honest dialogue about public finances. Spending cuts alone will not solve our problems. I support diversifying our tax base and do not favour relying entirely on income tax increases.

The current GST+ proposal raises valid concerns, even though it does include measures to protect lower earners. However, it cannot be implemented unless it has wider public support. It must be clearly explained and be part of a broader, fairer tax strategy. My priority is ensuring any changes are responsible and promote growth.

I'm Tom Moore, 39 years old, Guernsey-born with deep family roots on both sides going back generations, spent all my life living in Guernsey except for three years studying Computer Technology at the University of Portsmouth.

I attended two different primary schools and the Grammar School. I have worked in several sectors including food retail, charity retail, finance, aviation and ferries.

I have also done work for various local charities and spent three years on St Peter Port's Douzaine. I believe that this mix has allowed me to meet people from all walks of life and given me a feel for their plights.

Guernsey is not currently sustainable or fair. We need to fix that, together.

Tax Reform

We will run out of reserves by 2032 (according to data provided by public servants) unless we broaden our tax base or cut public spending and/or raise existing taxes to uncomfortable, self-defeating levels. The GST+ package isn't meant to make life harder for ordinary people but though grounded in research, the outcomes remain projections, not guarantees. I do believe we need to restructure our tax in such a way that is fair and doesn't risk driving out the most mobile contributors to our tax base. This could include a luxury goods tax, modest corporation tax (which over 60% of businesses who responded to the G8 survey support) and doubling the income tax cap. I would push the House to consider these options before resorting to revisiting the GST+ package.

Economy, Social Fairness & Sustainability

I believe we need to diversify our industry, produce and export our own energy, offer interest-free loans to households seeking greater self-sufficiency and lower running costs, put parental leave into law, further subsidise childcare and offer pooled, government-backed savings schemes for those in social housing, first-time buyers and those provisioning for their long-term care. I also believe there is more we can do to support our charity and hospitality sectors.

Deputy Commitment & Accountability

I also believe that States members should be dedicated to their role as Deputy. If the headcount of deputies were ever to be reduced to below 38, you will really notice who is pulling their weight and who isn't. Voters deserve deputies who treat the role as a serious, full-time commitment. I also believe attendance in committee and assembly meetings needs to be tracked and published in the Guernsey Press and the States' official digital channels.

Government Functions

There are efficiencies to be made by commercialising some States departments that are too top-heavy and lack frontline delivery. This would be great for States Works. Some commercialisation-privatisation hybrid model would work for STSB. I am completely against full privatisation, however.

Closing

These are all positions and ideas, not promises. The only promises I make, if elected, are to 1) work towards these aims; 2) work collaboratively with other States members for the common good of the island and 3) if the role of Disability Champion is reinstated, I will stand for it.

so little results. Working in hospitality I have learnt that the more beers you have on tap does not mean you will sell more beers- some don't even sell at all. Less deputies until results are achieved, if we really need more then so be it. The bar is crowded.

To enable sustainable growth, we need a clear understanding of our economy, both on a granular and a big-picture basis. Recognising our strengths and weaknesses is non-negotiable. Since the last election, our nominal economy has grown by 28%; a win worth noting, but inflation, which has outpaced the UK's, has eroded it almost entirely. Future economic growth must align with the innovation of our value proposition, enhancing our administrative model through growth in our advisory services, supported by digital frameworks, better travel links and improved communications.

We should not rely solely on increasing our workforce to boost our economy. Since 2020, our population has increased by 1,700 people, or 3% of the total, our fastest growth in modern history. With housing development lagging, property prices have soared by 27%, and rents have risen by 24%. Decisive action is urgent: boost housing, tame inflation, and spread prosperity.

Housing availability must be a core priority in the new term. It is especially important to our younger population. The island must foster a vibrant local ecosystem that encourages young people to stay, succeed and grow, creating initiatives like apprenticeships in emerging industries and incentives for young entrepreneurs who wish to live here and participate. We must, therefore, develop purpose-built housing for our young and their families. We must develop properties, change the use of ageing office and retail space for residential units and look for effective pragmatism in our planning regulations.

Travel links are critical to an island. They must serve industry, our community, and tourism. As a government, we must decide whether travel must be operated commercially or as an economic enabler. Understanding the difference is key to unlocking growth. My view is that connectivity is an enabler for our economy and we must aim for the best air and sea links, and help them flourish.

I have also travelled extensively and have seen how that Sector has developed in many countries. Sport has also always been one of my great loves. In my time I have been Chair of both the Guernsey Football Association and the Guernsey Cricket Association.

What difference can I make?

I hope with my experience I can help and contribute. I am a "cup half full" person, but I know that our beloved Island is facing many challenges. In the space permitted I can only address some of them.

Our Government System

We witness endless debates, and most seem to end up with no real conclusion. We need a slimline States. With effect from 2029 Election I would reduce the number of States members to 25, comprising 24 Deputies and 1 Alderney Representative.

Our Housing needs and Planning System

I am dismayed at the ongoing fiasco such as Leale's Yard and the ridiculous zoning such as Heritage of the Castel Hospital which should be reversed now. All unoccupied buildings should be taxed at such a rate so as to ensure they are occupied.

Our Tax System Public Spending

I say No to GST or increasing Income
Tax. We must be more efficient. Those
of us who work in the Private Sector can
see clearly that there is too much waste
in the Public Sector. We can cut States
spending. We need an independent audit
by business people to ensure every penny
of public money is necessary to be spent,
and is wisely spent.

I am certain that there is a level of Public Sector management that could be trimmed. We have a shortage of workers to fill vacancies in the Private Sector. I do not doubt that anyone made redundant in the Public Sector, if able, would obtain a position in the Private Sector.

We must ensure that our Revenue
Department collects more promptly
outstanding tax. We need to recover more
tax from the really high earners. I would
immediately stop those who shelter their
income in corporate structures being able
to do so.

I would impose, as other jurisdictions do, a luxury tax on items such as high value boats, motor vehicles and aircraft.

I would reintroduce an annual road users tax which would be applied to all vehicles, whether petrol, diesel or electric. In return for which I would freeze duty on fuel for the next 4 years.

Aurigny/Airport/ Harbours

If we are so lavish in our support of the Bus service, why are we demanding Aurigny make a profit? It should be run efficiently, but it should be seen as the gateway to Guernsey PLC.

We should look to create both a deepwater berth for cruise liners, and a nontidal marina for larger pleasure boats. Let private enterprise pay for it in return for long-term leases.

I would replace the Dorniers tomorrow. There are better options. I would look to leasing a jet to put back on our flagship route. It would show we are a jurisdiction that means business.

We should look to obtain more and sustainable Heathrow slots. I believe by having fixed fares at a lower rate we would encourage air travel.

Education

The closing of the Grammar School was a disaster, both educationally and for social mobility. We need to look again at providing better education opportunities for those who have lost out by these changes.

Immigration

We must encourage workers who contribute so much to our various employment sectors to feel welcome. We cannot manage without them, but we must also ensure that our Health, Housing and Education Sectors are not over-burdened.

Health

We have no option but to support our ageing population, but health costs will soon prove to be more than we can afford. We must investigate compulsory health insurance schemes. We must also ensure we run our health service as efficiently as it can be.

Finally, I promise that I would both fulfil my four-year term, and devote my energies to improving the lot of Islanders. I am fed up watching from the outside the debacle that is the States. I thus want to contribute from inside. With my skills and experience, if elected, I would seek a serious position because I know I can lead a team.

Temporary exemption for planning permission for certain changes of use of visitor accommodation into residential dwellings.

220 **VICTORIA OLIVER PAGE 1 OF 4** Harbour Action Area – The Local Planning Brief provides a clear and forward-thinking framework to guide and coordinate development while protecting the character of the waterfront. Consulting closely with the Guernsey Development Agency (GDA).

The streamlined amendment process makes updating the Island Development Plan faster and more efficient. It will help next term by allowing greater flexibility to respond to changing community and environmental needs.

Revised guidance on ancillary living units replaces the old dower unit policy, supporting a more flexible approach. It promotes multigenerational living and allows units even outside the Centres.

Digitisation project is nearing completion and will provide a new, browser-based digital platform for Planning and Building Control applications. This project has previously enabled the DPA to return £142,000 of recurring savings from its budget.

Economy

Ensuring value for money is ingrained in everything I do. We can only spend what we can afford. Being a small Island, we need to work harder to ensure value for money. We need to build on our strengths while embracing new opportunities.

Invest in skills and people - A strong economy starts with a skilled, adaptable workforce. We must manage inward migration carefully to protect our infrastructure, housing, and quality of life, while still welcoming offisland skills that our economy needs.

Grow beyond finance - We must protect our finance industry while also exploring ways to further diversify our economy. What else could Guernsey become famous for? Increase tourism by using the shoulder months to help the hospitality sector, host more sailing regattas and other high profile events, increase walking and historic holidays. We should also support and invest in Guernsey's fishing industry. It is not only a significant part of our heritage but also an important food source.

Back local business and entrepreneurs Small businesses are the backbone of our
island. Too often small business bears the
brunt of cost saving measures while larger
firms exploit generous allowances. For
entrepreneurs we need to promote and

create a "one-stop shop" for business registration, licensing and guidance. It is time to rebalance the scales by tailoring tax incentives to genuinely empower start-ups.

Fiscal policy

The government faces a structural challenge in balancing public service demands with a constrained and aging revenue base.

Guernsey plans to introduce a 5% Goods and Services Tax (GST) from July 2027 as part of a wider tax reform package, which includes income tax cuts for lower earners and changes to social security contributions. The package is expected to raise around £50 million a year, with decisions on food exemptions and the final rate left to the next States Assembly.

I supported the introduction of GST because, after careful consideration, it was the only viable option to keep Guernsey competitive and financially stable. However, I do **not** support putting GST on food. With Jersey and Isle of Man it would be beneficial to look at adjusting Zero 10. I do not want Guernsey to go into more debt. Savings must always come first.

Achieving savings: This term the States has extensively explored ways to save money, with the public, input and came to approx. £14million. These works needs to follow through. Simply trimming budgets/ services will not deliver - we need substantial structural changes.

Housing and development

Everyone agrees we need more homes, but we must build in the right places. I support growth that meets demand while protecting our unique environment and community character. The DPA does not build houses, it only facilitates their construction.

We should prioritise using brown field sites and build up instead of out.

IDP review: Continue the review while listening and taking on board views. While strengthening public/private partnerships between government and developers. Incentivise redevelopment of old greenhouses or unused areas within the main centres, leaving green fields alone.

Rental market: The States have ruined the local rent market by giving subsides to essential workers which has caused rents to increase exceptionally. Stop adding regulation to landlords. Remove the additional 2% document duty on buy-to-let property purchases which has negatively increased rentals.

Help first-time buyers: By providing grants or loans for first-time buyers struggling with deposits. I think it is a travesty our children are leaving the island because they cannot afford to live here.

Bond reform: I support removing the Bond, which is currently outdated, expensive, and inefficient. It will make it quicker, fairer, and more affordable for all parishioners.

Modular housing: Explore quicker, lowercost building methods such as modular homes to address urgent needs.

Achieving savings: - By building homes on land already owned instead of buying new land. Further streamline the planning system to reduce administrative costs and delays for both government and applicants.

Environment

Protecting the environment must be practical. We need to invest in a greener future.

- Deliver on the Climate Change Action Plan while balancing economic stability and fairness.
- Climate change affects our coastlines, our infrastructure and our way of life. We need to improve the flood defences to protect the built environment.
- Protect green spaces and facilitate more natural habitats
- We should continue work on the potential wind farm.

Achieving savings: - Where appropriate use natural solutions (e.g. planting and permeable surfaces) to manage flooding and reduce pressure on drainage systems.

Infrastructure

We need reliable transport from Aurigny and Brittany Ferries. When we book a flight or ferry, we expect it to run.

Fast internet and secure energy are also essentials.

Motor tax needs a comprehensive review for all road users to contribute fairly to infrastructure costs, especially as EV adoption increases.

Achieving savings: - Investing in local renewable energy can cut long-term energy costs and reduce import.

Government

I would like to evolve our system of government to a presidential-style system, the government would give the chief minister greater executive power, allowing them to choose their own cabinet or team of ministers. This centralisation of authority means the Chief Minister can act more decisively and implement policies more efficiently.

Education

Every child in Guernsey deserves access to a high-quality, modern education that prepares them for life and a rapidly changing world of work. We must get it right for the future of our island.

- We must finish the job of delivering a stable, well-resourced secondary school model, with proper investment in facilities, staff, and support services.
- Equally we must recognise that a good teacher can do more for children than any new building.
- We need to raise educational standards across the board whether academic, vocational, or special educational needs.
- We need to consider smaller class sizes.

Health

Health is a strong personal issue to me. The rising cost of medication is placing increasing pressure on both patients and the health budget.

- Recruitment and retention of healthcare professionals must be a top priority by training our own nurses.
- We must provide equal pay for nurses working locally. It is not fair that licensed nurses get a rent allowance while locals do not.
- We must invest in frontline services to ensure timely access to hospital operations, and mental health support.

 As our population ages, we must plan for the future of social care - ensuring dignity, choice, and proper support for older islanders to ensure they are not forced to sell their homes for long term care.

Achieving savings: The States of Guernsey can save money in healthcare by investing in preventative care, early intervention, and community-based support. By promoting healthier lifestyles and addressing health issues before they escalate, we can reduce long-term reliance on acute services and reducing reliance on costly off-island treatments. HSC, MSG and doctors surgeries need to all work from a single, integrated IT system to create efficiencies for patients and doctor, this would save time and money.

Some may call it scaremongering, but our Island way of life is under threat. Health provision, housing, education, growing the economy and balancing the books are all matters of significant concern. Regrettably, lack of money is key to many of these issues, and improving tax take, through efficiency measures and broadening the tax base, is essential. There are no easy solutions, but I believe my manifesto to contain practical approaches to address these issues. Team working, at committee level and on the floor of the House, will be necessary for success, putting behind us, hopefully, the divisive arguments of the past.

I'm a retired Consultant Physician, co-founder and twice Chairman of the Medical Specialist Group. For over 30 years, I've worked to shape a healthcare system that delivers free secondary care at the point of need. Throughout my professional career, I have been a 'team worker', as this is the basis for sound decision making in complex issues. I'm running as an Independent. Teamwork doesn't require party lines. Consensus government can work—and I've seen it work on HSC.

MY PRIORITIES

- Mental Wellbeing of Young People. The 2024 Wellbeing Survey revealed significant concerns. I will pursue a coordinated response across Health, Education, Home Affairs, Sport, and the third sector, building on the Guernsey Mental Health and Wellbeing Strategy, to strengthen and expand its impact. A HSC Board member will be appointed as Mental Health Champion
- **Hospital Modernisation;** but I will push for informed clinical debate to ensure that our priorities for Phase 2. remain correct, at this time of financial challenge
- Social Care Reform (SLAWS) Health reform is impossible without social care reform. I'll work to bring SLAWS (Supported Living and Ageing Well) back to the Assembly without delay
- **Primary Care Review.** We have in place an excellent system of Primary care, but this comes at a cost, which many find a challenge. We need to know that local practice matches best practice elsewhere, and that affordability issues, including the delivery model, are addressed
- Staff Recruitment & Retention the provision of Key Worker Housing (KWH) is paramount, but progress appears glacially slow. I will work towards KWH becoming available to locally qualified applicants
- Containing Costs. The NHS tracks productivity. We don't. I'll advocate for transparent data from all providers, and suggestions for evidence-based reforms, enactment of which could be balanced against proposed financial cuts
- Assisted Dying. As a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, I respect their neutrality in this matter. However, if elected, I recognise I will have an obligation to the public to make a decision, if and when this matter comes to the States. On balance, I would favour resources devoted to an improvement in the provision of comprehensive palliative care

I'M NOT A ONE ISSUE CANDIDATE

Local **'Think Tanks'** can and should inform the new Assembly on matters of contention, particularly those outside Deputies' major areas of interest. I contributed to the Health section of the Future Guernsey manifesto. From their press release...

'Future Guernsey is not a political party. Our sole aim is to ensure the people of Guernsey have the opportunity to vote for a future-focused, coherent plan of action'.

I am well informed of the difficulties in Housing, Climate, the economy, and Fiscal Sustainability. However, these important areas of concern have lain outside my main spheres of interest and experience. Where I remain undecided upon future policy in these matters (and others) I would look to the product of the 'Future Guernsey' think tank for guidance in these areas.

TAXATION & FAIRNESS

Guernsey is becoming a tale of two islands - the haves and the have-nots. We need:

- More efficient tax collection.
- A broader tax base to 'balance the books'.
- Some form of consumption tax seems inevitable, but, tiered, with higher rates on conspicuous consumption. But most importantly no extra burden on those already struggling.

ON EDUCATION

Our current secondary model may not be ideal, but further upheaval would harm students. We need to make it work - and build a working group of educators, government, and industry leaders to plan for the future.

ABOUT ME

I've called Guernsey home for 40 years. Born in Malta, educated in Bedford, trained in London (MRCP 1981, MD 1985, FRCP 1991), I moved here in 1985 with my young family.

I swim year-round, circuit train and practise yoga to maintain fitness. I enjoy hiking, angling, sailing and vegetable gardening. I help with my wife's floristry business—often spotted delivering blooms by cargo bike! I support community events like the 30 Bays and the 12 bays, the Everest Challenge (Val des Terres), and the Torteval Scarecrows.

- Co-founded MSG and chaired it twice.
- Helped deliver the first and second healthcare contracts, introducing free secondary care at the point of delivery. This was a genuine moment of Social Change for the island

Many of you would like to downsize but cannot due to lack of suitable housing, so you risk becoming asset rich and cash poor. I am committed to finding solutions, such as linking you with keyworkers who we could vet for you and who are in need of a room.



Healthcare

Access to healthcare at the point of need is still too high a cost for many, particularly for those who need to see a GP or go to A&E. The ideas set out in the Partnership of Purpose Plan should be revisited and a form of means testing considered.



Social care

Many of you worry about who will be there to help look after you in your later years. I will strive to ensure there are appropriate standards of care to protect you at home and in the community, and sufficient care providers to manage the rising demand.

I've been paying close attention to the difficulties the island is facing and how previous efforts to address them have often fallen short.

Guernsey needs politicians who are prepared to face these challenges head on – people who will collaborate, listen to advice, and focus on solutions that genuinely work. I believe Jayne is that kind of leader. Her approach gives me hope for a fairer future for everyone in Guernsey, and I'm proud to give her my vote.

Summary Manifesto

We must reform our corporate tax system. I oppose the introduction or increase of taxes on the resident population until we ensure that companies doing business on Guernsey pay their fair share. I am opposed to GST.

We must restore growth to our economy, diversify our economy to provide a greater variety of jobs and solve the affordable housing crisis.

I have served as a Deputy for most of the last 20 years, and have held the posts of Minister of Treasury & Resources, President of the Committee for Economic Development and President of the States Trading Supervisory Board.

Why am I opposed to a GST at this time?

Guernsey's financial position is stronger than many would have us believe. We have a balance sheet with significant assets and a minimal amount of borrowing, but more importantly our revenue account is in better shape than most people think. In the debates about fiscal policy last year, I consistently said that the tax take from 'Pillar 2' of the OECD's Global Tax Deal would be much greater than Treasury had forecast. Sure enough in December, Treasury revised its estimates up from about £10m to "at least £30m".

I think the receipts will be even higher, possibly higher than our forecast 'fiscal deficit' of £71m. It is true that we will not know the precise figure until all of the companies within the scope of Pillar 2 make their tax returns, and we will have to wait until 2026 or possibly even 2027 to know the final figure. But the point is that the first year for which these amounts will be due is 2025. We are already 'earning' the tax due under Pillar 2. And since we now prepare our accounts on an accruals basis, the tax due for 2025 will appear in our accounts as revenue of 2025. I think we may now be recording surpluses.

And in this context, it makes no sense to be adding a GST to the burden on the Guernsey public.

But we should go further

Under the Zero-10 tax system, most of the companies operating in our domestic economy escape tax on their income. So, the smaller shops, hotels, restaurants, garages, hairdressers, but also the firms of advocates, accountants, architects etc may also be liable to tax at the zero rate. Worse still, wealthy individuals can benefit from this by putting their income-producing assets into companies, which may be liable to no tax on their income.

It is essential that Guernsey is able to tax its domestic economy, and we must adopt a corporate tax system that allows us to do so.

The growth issue

When Zero-10 was introduced, Guernsey lost £100m in corporate tax receipts. But we were told that the damage would be repaired, in part, by economic growth. In fact there has been little or no growth in our economy since then, and increases in the cost of living have, for many people, overtaken increases in real incomes. We need to restore sustainable growth to our economy, and at the same time diversify the economy, both to make it more resilient and to provide a wider choice of careers for our young people. I believe that a catalyst to growth could be an international university project (see https://theuniversity.gg/for further information).

Housing

Speaking of our young people, we absolutely have to ensure that there is an adequate supply of affordable housing on the island. Young people are leaving Guernsey because they do not see a future for themselves here. While a limited choice of career opportunities is part of the problem, the cost of living in Guernsey, and more specifically the cost of housing, is a principal reason. The States must intervene in the housing market as a developer of affordable housing, which will be sold subject to conditions regarding sell-on terms.

collective and fully coordinated government, with fewer Deputies held to account through identifiable leadership. The Isle of Man model operates with 24 elected members, compared to our 40, and operates an effective executive system, combined with a much more robust system of scrutiny.

A new Assembly must quickly dust off the respected '2000 Harwood Report' and change this failed government machinery, to one that gets things done.



Fix the Economy

Our economy is in dire straits. We have failed to agree a viable fiscal policy and have amassed a huge deficit. Despite multiple debates, some Deputies buried their heads in the sand and failed to grasp this fundamental nettle. Some who shouted loudest against tax reforms, offered no solutions, demanding more spending on their pet projects!

The economy can only grow if government invests in vital crumbling infrastructure. The list of priority capital projects outstanding amount to a staggering one billion pounds.

The Isle of Man and Jersey, our biggest competitors, have a consumption tax, as do most other jurisdictions on the globe, which spreads their tax base. The Isle of Man currently collects one billion pounds in three years and Jersey the same in nine years. From the get-go, we must set fiscal policy. It must include the implementation of the finally agreed progressive tax package, or one similar, mitigated by lowering income tax on the first £30k and reforming social insurance contributions rendering them less regressive.

We also need urgent work on the 'Pillar 2' Global Rules (Corporate income tax), without harming our vital finance industry, to raise circa £30m.



Safety and Security

It is said that safety and security of its citizens is the first duty of government. We have a right to expect to enjoy our lives, protected from crime. We have levels of safety not found elsewhere but must not be complacent. Government must continue to build on the extensive initiatives this term, such as fighting crime and protecting victims, in particular tackling domestic abuse and sexual violence, the provision of the Sexual Assault Referral Centre, tackling cybercrime and online safety and transforming the Criminal Justice system. Continued engagement with our excellent third sector partners, who also provide support to victims, is essential.

We must play our part in fighting global crime. We were evaluated by Moneyval in 2024 and obtained an excellent outcome, which is vital to our continued success as a leading global financial centre. We must not take our foot off the pedal and continue to meet international standards.

Make Public Services fit for Purpose

As outlined, we need to reform government and fix the economy. This must go hand and glove with protecting and reviewing public services. Whilst Guernsey spends less on its government than just about anywhere and we enjoy outstanding front-line professionals, like all jurisdictions, transformation is essential. In a unique small island jurisdiction, we clearly have opportunities to avoid silos and duplication of effort.

Target Operating Delivery models and corporate services require attention. Commissioning our outstanding local third sector is essential within this process. We must support, incentivise and work with our public servants to modernise and become more efficient. Investing in training, development, staff appraisal accountability and performance related progression is key.



Education & Upskilling the Workforce

To keep the economy and front-line requirements going, we need to attract more local people into our businesses, industries and public services. We must also remain appreciative of those from overseas that the business sector simply cannot do without. The post Brexit environment has unfortunately caused global labour recruitment challenges, but we need to be mindful of the demands on our services and housing.

We must orientate education and our workforce toward filling our recruitment demands focusing on Guernsey's residents. Industry and governments' 'Skills Guernsey' must combine to tailor our curriculum and career enhancement toward those demands. More emphasis must be channelled into our excellent Guernsey Institute, due to benefit from an essential new facility next term.



Address the Housing Crisis

Just about everyone agrees there is a housing crisis. The dream for families to own a home is disappearing and rents are becoming unaffordable. We are not building enough houses and government policies are not working. The infamous GP 11 failed. Our English based development laws are over engineered causing delay and expense. An investigation into our extortionate cost of building materials, compared to the UK and Jersey, is also needed.

This crisis must first and foremost be viewed through the lens of local residents. States owned land and buildings must come into the equation. A scheme of truly affordable loans to first time buyers needs to be brought into government scope. The work of our excellent Guernsey Housing Association must also continue to be supported.







- I would reluctantly support the potential introduction of GST but believe there must be more work to understand exactly how it plays a role within a properly diversified tax base. Even so there must be targeted exemptions for a wide range of goods and services to alleviate the detrimental impact on the vulnerable, young, families and the charitable sector.
- I will advocate for a fully developed future facing tourism strategy that balances growth with sustainability and quality. Our Bailiwick has much to offer, and we must take this opportunity.

Skills, Education, and Opportunity

Strive-Revive-THRIVE

I do not want to be your average politician; I want to be a true People's Deputy. I'm a devoted husband to my wife Kaleigh, fur-father to our puppy Tala, and an extremely excited dad-to-be. I was privileged to grow up on this beautiful island we call home. Now, I want to put my skillset to work ensuring future generations continue to be as fortunate.

First promise: To attend all meetings, work diligently and tirelessly, and always put Guernsey's interests first and foremost.

Over the next four years, I will **strive** to help our island **revive** its economy and once again **thrive** for years to come. I've spent many hours researching local issues, following order papers while listening to debates, and reading billets d'etat to prepare for the challenge.

In 2008, I stood as a Guernsey's youngest ever candidate in my beloved parish, the Vale. I received over 30% of the vote, narrowly missing out on success. The feedback from the electorate was to gain life experience before trying again, which is exactly what I have done:

- <u>Creative</u>, entrepreneurial, and resourceful: evidenced by having started, run and sold successful businesses: one in Vietnam's tourism industry; another in Hong Kong's education sector
- <u>Strong communicator:</u> an English teacher who has also spent years working as a freelance writer for magazines and newspapers (from the Guernsey Press to the South China Morning Post) and many hours studying **clear, concise, and cohesive communication** techniques
- <u>Hardworking:</u> Having spent my teenage years shovelling metal enriched mud in Guernsey's scrap yard and years since working sixty-hour weeks to set up and run successful businesses—I know how to toil diligently for success
- <u>Team player:</u> with over fifteen years of experience and a **100% success rate working with people of all races and cultures** in countries around the world, and more recently, experience leading a team of five in Guernsey's finance industry

Current Work

I teach English, cookery, and other life skills classes at Les Nichols Prison. I'm also a tutor offering private lessons to children and adults in a range of subjects including creative writing, English as a foreign language, and Artificial Intelligence awareness.

There's no magic wand to fix our finances, deliver affordable housing, or fund major infrastructure projects overnight. This political term demands hard work, dedication, and difficult decisions. Here is a succinct breakdown of my top priorities:

Reform

Guernsey's government is broken. While I respect our traditions, it is time to have an independent board look at:

- Cutting the number of deputies by 50%
- Forming an executive style of government where the people of Guernsey can—at the very least—choose their Chief Executive for the term
- Introduce far greater transparency and accountability measures

Who is to blame for the current state of our poor Sarnia Cherie? Apparently nobody. With an executive form of government and reduction in the number of States Members, decision making will become streamlined and the public will find it clearer to see which deputies are to be held to account.

NO to GST

There is a good chance that Pillar Two (a tax upon Large Multinational Enterprises, implemented globally) will help to cover much of our deficit. First we have to:

- Act fast to define Pillar Two's expected revenue
- Then look at broadening the corporate tax base to bolster our reserves
- And, <u>only if absolutely necessary</u>, raise income tax by 2% and ring fence (keep aside) the
 extra revenue generated for **spending on education and health services** (in line with the
 lsle of Man)

There are other options before introducing the dreaded GST. Not to mention, our current Revenue Service already struggles to manage income tax collection, so how can we expect a new collection and compliance function to run smoothly?

Economy

It beggars belief that Guernsey, with a Gross Domestic Product on par with Luxembourg, has been left financially crippled by successive economic downturns. Our politicians must strive to ensure the economy can revive so Guernsey can once again thrive by:

- Collaborating with our neighbouring jurisdictions to broaden the corporate tax base while protecting Small/Medium-sized Enterprises
- Making cuts to superfluous spending—starting with the number of deputies
- Publicly detail how Guernsey's bond borrowing and Revolving Credit Agreements are working to reduce our debt rather than rely on it

Nobody wants to see Guernsey lose its competitive edge, so our politicians must be the ones who strive—not the public—to revive our economy.

<u>Housing</u>

We have land earmarked for housing in the Island Development Plan and yet no houses being built to stave off the crisis. We need to:

- Cut more red tape to **get the government out of developers' way**, especially for those who wish to develop housing under £500k
- Encourage the building of **low-level and affordable apartment buildings** (units under 350k) where appropriate—with suitable outdoor and green space—fit for first time buyers
- Support the Guernsey Housing Association in building further Affordable Housing (legally defined) on States-owned land for the purpose of key workers, rental, or partial-ownership

We have a new Housing Committee which must veer away from further red tape and focus on facilitating spades in the ground. Otherwise, this committee will be a total waste of money.

Education

As an educator, I am well aware that our teachers, not politicians, know what is best for their students. As such, I want to:

- Grant greater devolution of powers from ESC to school governors while facilitating further input from teachers
- Financially support locals returning as trained teachers rather than only enticing foreign staff to the island
- Seek strategic prioritisation and planning that ensures staffing and a **robust early years program** for years to come

We are set on a course toward the Transforming Education Programme, and it is imperative that we complete this project as quickly and effectively as possible, while at the same time looking to fix our early years education issues.

Pensioners

Our islanders of pension age are the giants upon whose shoulders we stand. I will:

- Fight to ensure pensioners' benefits
- Work to **protect pensioners on a low-income** from cost of living increases
- Support and facilitate the development of long-term care options and benefits

We owe our way of life to those who have worked theirs for Guernsey, and still contribute via taxable income on their pensions. I will not forget the debt I owe our elders.

Youth

To secure the future we must secure our youth on-island by working to provide:

- Tax incentives for under-30s who study locally or return to the island after study
- Tax-free savings schemes aimed at securing deposits for first-time home buyers
- Encourage developers to build affordable first-time-buyer properties


With an ageing population, we need to act now to help our youth secure their foothold on the island. Otherwise, we will have much worse problems than those presented by our housing crisis.





Vote for me and I will commit my time and energy to doing what I can to improving the housing situation, aiming for more housing availability for a cross section of Guernsey people.

My key aim is to deliver real results in tackling our housing problem, as quickly as possible.

I have proven experience of achieving exactly that, having spent over 40 years in my career getting affordable housing built, just over 23 years in England and latterly 17 years as the Chief Executive of Guernsey Housing Association. During that time **GHA built 900 homes in Guernsey** for people in need of housing. It is significant that in July 2018 the States voted that new social house building should be reduced to only 35 homes a year as the housing market had slumped, this target was increased in 2022 when the housing need had rocketed.

I retired from GHA two years ago, and I now wish to do what I can as a Deputy to help local people get housed affordably. I will use my 17 years of experience working in partnership with States Committees and civil servants to find solutions. If you elect me, I would like to join the newly formed Housing Committee to do everything within my power to reduce the housing problems islanders are facing.

Why should you vote for me?

In my career of over 40 years I have worked for several Housing Associations and a private developer, all focussed on getting affordable housing built. My experience covers everything from finding the land to completed homes. This includes legal issues, financial appraisals, and client project management of the construction teams to get new homes built on time, to budget, and occupied.

Since retiring from Guernsey Housing Association (a not for profit company, independent of the States) I have worked as a housing consultant and increased my voluntary work. My current voluntary roles include being the Chair of the Guille-Allès Library Trustees, a steward for St James events, and assisting at the Guernsey Literary Festival each year.

I can bring valuable skills, knowledge and experience to the role of a Deputy. I am keen to improve the quality of life for Guernsey people, keen to improve the island's finances, and keen to provide more homes. I am courteous, a team player, accustomed to working cooperatively, finding solutions and compromises.

As housing is both one of the most important issues facing Guernsey, and an area where I can offer expertise and experience, I have focussed most of my manifesto on this key issue. Over the last 9 months I have met with a small group of housing professionals to produce a set of housing policy ideas that could reduce the housing problem by getting more homes built faster and encourage young people to stay and save for a deposit with tax incentives. Some of these policies are summarised below.

Why do we need more housing? We need more private sale and affordable housing in the island to accommodate our young people and encourage them to stay, to house our young families and key workers. We need more houses in Guernsey because we're all living longer, because we are less likely to live in multigenerational houses and because all households want a place of their own. We need to import essential workers, whose skills we depend on for our health service and other key jobs, and vitally we also need to be able to accommodate local people who are struggling to find housing that is affordable and suits their needs.

What we need now are solutions, which are undoubtedly the difficult issue. Crucially we need more homes, of the right type, cost and quality, for people to buy and to rent.

New Homes - as well as progressing the housing policy ideas listed below, if elected I intend to examine all the large housing projects that have been approved but not yet been built to find out why, talk to the developers about what is holding them up, and what if anything the States could do to move them along faster. One example is Leales Yard which would make a huge difference to the provision of new homes as well as a major rejuvenation of The Bridge area. The finances obviously need close scrutiny to ensure everyone is getting a fair deal, but this project is advanced and could start delivering new homes within this next States term.

Economy – we need a strong thriving economy and as the wide-ranging finance sector is our financial lifeblood we need to look carefully at allowing the sector to diversify without over regulation.

States finances – the States Assembly faces some difficult decisions in this next term as government annual spending exceeds its income which cannot go on. I am not in favour of GST however the States must increase its income, which could be achieved through a raft of measures alongside spending efficiencies. A start could be to go back through the many previous consultants reports of potential savings and taking action.

Education – I am endeavouring to remain positive throughout this manifesto however the last few years of the secondary education changes have not been ideal and have left many parents, students and employers wondering what is going on. Action needs to be taken to ensure that the Education Dept is delivering the best education possible for our young people.

Health – this a constantly growing sector as people live longer and require support for longer. Health needs constant evaluation on what we can and cannot do as a small island and whether we can work more cost effectively with our neighbours.

Connectivity – reliability and cost of the current air connectivity is not working and action needs to be taken to improve the current situation. This should include growing the market to include other airlines and realistic appraisal of the options to extend the airport runway.

Impact of climate change – we need a plan of action on our sea flood defences and water catchment. I would be keen to encourage greater energy independence, including potential wind power and tidal power as well as incentivising solar panels on roofs across the island rather than paying for another cable to France (which increases our dependence on other countries).

My housing policies

Assisting first time buyers by:

- Using planning policy to increase the number of homes in a project's developable area, for example, to allow building up rather than out, where appropriate.
- Scrapping document duty for developers and purchasers for new developments sold for less than £600k to first time buyers.
- Lowering the rate of income tax charged to 10% on the profits made by developers building and selling new units for less than £600k properties, to incentivize their construction.
- The Island Development Plan (IDP) currently being reviewed could designate new affordable housing land at a discounted land cost, enabling builders to sell to first time buyers at a 25% to 30% reduced price, with the discount tied in legally forever, so future buyers also benefit. I have already put this forward as a written proposal in the ongoing IDP Review.

Increasing the quality and number of homes in the rental market by:

- Encouraging and supporting landlords to invest in improving their rental properties by allowing a tax deduction for the cost of repairs and improvements.
- Lowering the rate of income tax charged to 10% on build to let rental income for five years.
- Abolishing the 2% Document Duty for second homes.

Building more homes by:

- Ensuring that the IDP allocates sites at a rate
 of twice the number of units identified as
 needed during the planning period,
 increasing the chances that some will get
 developed.
- Introducing a penalty for not developing sites available for occupation within 3 years by reducing the developable area available on the site by 20% every 3 years. These sites would then become green open space, compensating for development elsewhere and incentivising developers to speed up development.
- Encouraging developers to come forward with mixed tenure developments, with a bias towards social and affordable housing whilst maintaining the ability to deliver a profitable scheme, through the inclusion of private market dwellings.
- Increasing available sites by reclassifying redundant greenhouse sites in or adjacent to the IDP Main Centres and Local Centres as 'brownfield land', enabling the sites future use for residential housing schemes of any viable tenure.
- Building new housing behind historic building frontages to create more new modern homes in St Peter Port.
- Be willing to explore a variety of partnerships for joint ventures to design, build and manage more social housing
- Trialing for 24 months lower tip-fees for brownfield developments to see if this encourages bringing back into use contaminated land at lower cost rather than easier-to-build on greenfield sites.

Improving the Labour and Skills Capacity in the building sector

- Train local people by introducing into the States' secondary education sector from September 2026 the innovative Design, Engineer, Construct (DEC) curriculum, which leads to recognised qualifications in building and infrastructure design. Also conduct an assessment of skills shortages and promote, support and develop the apprenticeship scheme at The Guernsey Institute to ensure that it is effectively supporting new entrants to the construction sector.
- Amend States tender procurement rules to ensure future States' building contracts include appropriate targets for employing apprentices and work experience sessions.
- Where possible and appropriate, allow construction workers to live in temporary accommodation on a building site for the duration of the project to make it easier to bring in specific required skills for the duration of a given development.
- Introduce a 'fast track' (within 14 days) work permit process for construction staff that are required within the construction industry provided they are being accommodated on-site, in hotels or within HMO/lodging house-style accommodation, to avoid further pressure on the local market.
- Permit non-local construction staff with longstanding local experience to move into permanent accommodation to encourage them to continue to support the local construction sector, subject to control on numbers.

Improving delivery by the Development & Planning Authority (DPA)

- Speed up the larger projects planning applications through careful scrutiny identifying where and why there are delays and assessing whether the planning officers are adequately resourced.
- More readily permitting changes in properties' Use Classes to help reuse buildings as the island's requirements change.


